City Ordinances Regarding Dogs Chapter 13 Police Offenses


Section 4—Paragraph P-Removal of Excrement

It shall be unlawful for the owner or person in control of any dog to allow that dog to appear in any public place or upon the property of any other person, unless said owner or person in control has in his or her possession a mechanical or other device for removal of excrement deposited by said dog in any such place. This ordinance shall not apply to a blind person while walking his or her guide dog.

HELP US KEEP STORM WATER CLEAN!!!!


When our pets defecate and it is not picked up, rain washes it into our storm drains or overland with storm water, which lead to our favorite fishing spots, swimming holes, and drinking water.

Pet waste is full of bacteria that can make wildlife and people sick.

Somersworth ordinance requires that as a pet owner, you pick up after your dog and dispose of the waste properly.

Also, keeping your cat indoors is a great way to keep it safe from large predators and protect the environment.

Please don't deposit the waste into the storm drains-these often lead directly to the Salmon Falls River!



Scoop it up and flush it down the toilet. That's the best because then your community sewage treatment plant or your septic system treat the pet waste.

Seal the waste in a plastic bag and throw it in the garbage.

TIP: Use a sandwich bag as a glove!

Bury small quantities in your yard where it can decompose slowly. Dig a hole one foot deep. Put 3-4 inches of waste of waste with at least 8 inches of soil. Bury the waste in several different locations in your yard and keep it away from your vegetable garden or drinking well.

Scoop the poop! It's your "doodie" as a responsible pet owner.
