New Business (under Section 15 of Agenda)

Ordinances

- A. Ordinance No. 15-21: To Amend Chapter 7, Solid Waste and Recycling, Section 7.4 Fees. The Finance Committee met on April 19th and voted to support a fifteen cent (.15) increase of the City's municipal solid waste bags. Attached is a memorandum providing an analysis of the Pay-per-bag program from Finance Director Scott Smith. I recommend a Public Hearing at the next regular Council meeting. Please see the attached red-lined changes in this Ordinance.
- B. Ordinance No. 16-21: Supplemental Appropriation for an Amendment to the Wright-Pierce Contract for the Engineering and Design of the Main Street and Constitutional Way Complete Streets Projects. The Finance Committee and Public Works & Environment Committee met on April 19th and voted to sponsor this Ordinance regarding a Supplemental Appropriation for these Complete Streets project. Finance Director Scott Smith explained the project was originally only funded through the general fund, although each involve water and sewer improvements. City Staff recommends a supplemental appropriation from both the water and sewer funds. This would split the total cost of \$197,000 between the water fund and sewer fund, at \$98,500 each. I recommend a Public Hearing at the next regular Council meeting.

A. Resolution No. 37-21: To Authorize the City Manager to Amend the Contract with Wright-Pierce Engineers of Portsmouth, NH for Engineering and Design Services for the Main Street and Constitutional Way Complete Streets Project. The Public Works & Environment Committee & Finance Committee met on April 19th and voted to approve the Amendment to the Wright Pierce contract for these Complete Streets project. Please see attached memorandum from Finance Director Scott Smith regarding this Contract Amendment.



TO AMEND CHAPTER 7, SOLID WASTE AND RECYCLING, SECTION 7.4 - FEES

May 3, 2021

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SOMERSWORTH THAT the Ordinances of the City of Somersworth as amended, be further amended as follows:

Amend Chapter 7, Solid Waste and Recycling, Section 7.4 – Fees, by deleting it in its entirety and replacing it with the following:

Section 7.4 – Fees: Effective July 1, 2021, the retail cost of the bags shall be \$2.15 for a 30-gallon bag and \$1.60 for a 15-gallon bag. Ten cents (.10) from the sale of each bag shall be utilized to subsidize the cost to the City for recycling or for any other cost related to solid waste and recycling collection and disposal. The cost to vendors shall be \$.02 cents less to provide financial incentive for selling the bags.

This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

The ninety (90) day waiting period will allow the City to review the request and, if approved, to make arrangements with the contracted hauler to collect waste from the structure(s) in question.

Those businesses not using the City approved specially marked bags are responsible for making their own arrangements for rubbish removal and disposal.

Section 7.4 – Fees.

Effective July 1, 2019 2021, the retail cost of the bags shall be \$2.00_15 for a 30-gallon bag and \$1.45_60 for a 15-gallon bag. Ten cents (.10) from the sale of each bag shall be utilized to subsidize the cost to the City for recycling or for any other cost related to solid waste and recycling collection and disposal. The cost to vendors shall be \$.02 cents less to provide financial incentive for selling the bags. (Amended 09/21/2015.) (Amended 03/18/2019)

<u>Section 7.5 – Litter on Public/Private Property: Owner's Duty.</u>

Litter, rubbish or refuse shall not be cast, scattered, thrown, deposited or permitted to remain on or about public or private property within the corporate limits of the City to the detriment of public peace, health, safety and welfare. The owner, lessees, agents or other in charge of premises within the City shall rid such land and abutting sidewalks and medians of such nuisance as defined in Sections 7.1 of this ordinance within twenty-four (24) hours after receiving notification from the City of the violation, or place in an authorized receptacle as outlined in Section 24.8 of the Housing Code, Section 7.1 of this ordinance. It shall be unlawful for any person to dump, place, scatter litter, refuse or rubbish on or about private premises, whether such premises are vacant or inhabited.

<u>Section 7.6 – Removal of Empty Containers (Home and Commercial).</u>

Rubbish containers, and rubbish must be removed by the owner from the curbside within twenty-four (24) hours after the scheduled pickup. Any debris strewn from this rubbish by animals, wind, etc., will be cleaned up by the owners within twenty-four (24) hours. Rubbish collection crews will be responsible for any debris they drop or spill on the ground and will clean it up before moving on to the next stop, provided that the owner has complied with Section 7.1, the definitions of "bags", "bundle" and "container".

Section 7.7 – Hazardous Waste.

Hazardous waste, as defined in Section 7.1, the definition of "hazardous waste", will not be accepted for pickup by the City and shall not be placed at the curb for such pickup.

Section 7.8 – Anti-scavenging.

Re: Pay-per-bags

Attached are two spreadsheets providing an analysis of the "Pay-Per-Bag" rates for the City curbside solid waste program. The analysis goes through fiscal year 2025 which coincides with the final year of the City's contract with Waste Management for curbside pick-up.

By way of information, please accept the following:

- Current rates are \$2.00/bag for 30-gallon bags, and \$1.45/bag for 15-gallon bags.
- Under the current rate structure, .10 cents for each bag is held to subsidize the cost of recycling or any other cost related to solid waste and recycling collection and disposal.
- The City currently has \$41,000 retained from the .10 cent premium on bags.
- Under the current rates the City could realize an operating deficit, net of the .10 cent premium held for recycling, in the amount of \$27,000.
- The first analysis demonstrates the estimated results of a .10 cent increase in bag rates, each year starting on July 1, 2021.
- The second analysis demonstrates the estimated results of a .15 cent increase in bag rates, each year starting on July 1, 2021.
- Each analysis assumes the .10 cent per bag premium for recycling stays in effect through Fiscal Year 2025.

Re: Wright-Pierce - Complete Streets Contract Amendment

The City has been in contact with Congressman Pappas' office regarding grant funding possibilities for the Main Street and Constitutional Way complete streets projects.

Staff has reached out to Wright-Pierce Engineers, the consultant currently under contract for these projects, and requested a proposal to prioritize these projects and have them "shovel ready" for the 2022 construction season. The proposal received is \$197,000 in additional to what is left on the current contract.

In order to fund this, the City may want to consider the following:

- The original contract was for \$384,270. There is approximately \$80,000 left available.
- The entire project was for water, sewer, and general fund improvements (i.e. sidewalks, drainage, road resurfacing).
- The initial funding was providing entirely by the general fund through the road resurfacing line item.
- These projects are generally thought to be 1/3 from each fund, water fund, sewer fund, and general fund.
- The City may wish to consider funding the contract amendment with a supplemental appropriation utilizing the water fund and sewer fund. That would be \$98,500 from each fund.
- There is current cash available of \$3.7 million in the water fund, and \$3.3 million in the sewer fund.

WHEREAS, an Agreement was entered on December 22, 2017 between the CLIENT and ENGINEER, which Agreement is entitled Agreement Between City of Somersworth, NH and Wright-Pierce for Constitutional Way, Main Street, and Cemetery Road Reconstruction Projects (hereinafter referred to as AGREEMENT).

WHEREAS, CLIENT has requested ENGINEER to update this agreement in order to expedite preparation of project plans and specifications for Constitutional Way and Main Street for bidding readiness in an anticipation of federal infrastructure stimulus funding.

WHEREAS, CLIENT has requested ENGINEER to design additional improvements as part of the Cemetery Road Reconstruction project.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of said AGREEMENT and other good and valuable considerations, it is hereby agreed and acknowledged by and between CLIENT and ENGINEER to amend the AGREEMENT as follows:

- 1. The AGREEMENT shall be amended to include this AMENDMENT, a copy of which shall be attached thereto and made a part thereof.
- 2. Revise the following scope of services in SECTION 1 of the AGREEMENT:
 - I. File Review and Field Data Collection Phase

ADD to paragraph E: Complete wetland delineation for proposed stormwater outfall locations along Salmon Falls River.

ADD to paragraph F: Complete additional topographic and existing conditions survey needed for proposed stormwater outfalls. It is anticipated that this survey will be on property outside the right of way and will require coordination with and permission from property owners.

ADD paragraph H: Complete comprehensive review of City records to identify existing utility connections. Complete field investigation to confirm existing utility connections and need to maintain connections.

ADD paragraph I: Prepare New Hampshire Division of Historical Resources Request for Project Review to identify the potential for the project to impact historical resources. It is anticipated this review will be a requirement of federal stimulus funding.

II. Preliminary Design Phase

ADD to paragraph B: Engage a landscape architect to assist with streetscape design elements including sidewalks, street trees, planters, benches, signage, etc.

ADD to paragraph E: Prepare state wetland application for proposed impacts needed for new stormwater outfall construction. Complete an evaluation of feasible stormwater treatment practices to incorporate into the project for compliance with NPDES MS4 and Great Bay Total Nitrogen permits.

III. 60% Design Phase

ADD paragraph F: The need for additional progress meetings is anticipated to facilitate efficient coordination of project plans and contract document preparation and compliance with federal funding requirements. Anticipate one additional meeting for Constitutional Way and six additional meetings for Main Street.

3. Add the following scope of services to SECTION 1 of the AGREEMENT:

VII. Sanitary Sewer Flow Metering

During this phase, ENGINEER shall perform the following services:

- A. Complete 15 days of flow metering for one (1) 10-inch clay sanitary sewer main at existing manhole (#5383) located in front of #5 and #6 Cemetery Road.
- 1) Install and remove flow meter in existing 15-inch clay sanitary sewer main for up to 15 days. OSHA certified field personnel will perform confined space entries to install and uninstall the meter.
- 2) Flow Data Analysis:
 - i. ENGINEER will collect and analyze the flow data recorded by the flow meter and prepare a data summary for the City.
 - ii. ENGINEER will provide sewer design recommendations to the City based on the results of the flow meter data analysis.

VIII. Addition of Cemetery Road Sidewalk

During this phase, ENGINEER shall perform the following services:

- A. Add Sidewalk to Design Plans:
- ENGINEER will add the proposed sidewalk on the Cemetery Road design plans. Sidewalk design will include plan representation as well as updated roadway cross sections and typical design sections. Stormwater analysis will be updated and permitting requirements will be evaluated.

IX. Addition of Doelson Street

During this phase, ENGINEER shall perform the following services:

- A. Add Doelson Street to Design Plans:
- 1) ENGINEER will add the first 100-ft of Doelson Street (off Cemetery Road) to the Cemetery Road Reconstruction project area. Perform the scope of services described in Sections I through V for this additional project area. (Note: additional geotechnical exploration is not included in this scope.)

X. Easements

During this phase, ENGINEER shall perform the following services:

- A. Prepare permanent drainage easement
- 1) ENGINEER will prepare easement plan and legal description for existing culvert crossing of Cemetery Road that will be replaced with the project. The easement will be for Map 13, Lot 55 and Map 13, Lot 56.
- 2) ENGINEER will prepare easement plan and legal description for new stormwater infrastructure located outside of the right of way.
- 4. SECTION 2 COMPENSATION to be updated to add \$197,000 for amendments to scope items identified herein.

Re: City of Somersworth – Mayor and Council Support for the Main Street Complete Streets Project

Dear Congressman Pappas:

On behalf of the Citizens of the City of Somersworth and our City Council, I am writing to offer our enthusiastic support of the Main Street Complete Streets Project. As one of the smaller NH Cities, we are challenged with balancing the needed funding to support all the critical municipal services we provide to our Community with the need to fund improvements to our aged and failing infrastructure. We ask for your support in seeking out funding to assist our Community to address these needs.

This project is currently in the design phase and will be shovel ready and prepared to go out to bid in the fall of this year. This project will replace water and sewer lines, make storm drainage improvements, add new sidewalks, construct street scaping with lighting and public gathering places, as well as the placement of a new surface on Main Street.

Some of the key elements that make this project so vital to the City are as follows:

- It continues improvements started by the City in the downtown core. This project will tie in
 directly to complete streets improvements made on High Street, Market Street, and the
 Somersworth/Berwick Bridge and further promote our City's economic revitalization to
 create a vibrant Community downtown.
- Main Street is home to the former General Electric (GE) complex and a row of underutilized
 mixed-use facilities. The former GE complex, once a thriving manufacturing plant, is now
 owned by Aclara and is soon to be closed. These improvements will promote economic
 development in this corridor, attract new and continued investment in this area of the City,
