6:30 p.m. City Council Workshop - CMAQ Grant

The intent of this Workshop is to collect input from the public relative to the existing conditions, concerns, and project goals. Sebago Technics our Engineering Firm will review the existing site conditions, contemplated improvements, and proposed construction schedule.

Attached is a synopsis of the Grant provided by Director Shanna Saunders. A copy of our Consultant, Sebago Technics presentation is also attached.

New Business (Under Section 5 of Agenda)

Ordinances

A. Ordinance No. 19-20: To Amend Chapter 13, Police Offenses, Section 13.3.1-D, No Parking Anytime. This Ordinance change was brought forward by Councilor David A. Witham. I recommend a Public Hearing at the next regular Council meeting to be scheduled by Mayor Hilliard. Attached is a copy of the location as provided by Councilor Witham along with his email. As noted, The City will need to better mark a "no parking" zone as State Law prohibits parking within 30 feet of a stop sign.

Resolutions

A. Resolution No. 46-20: To Authorize the City Manager to Enter into a Grant Agreement with the State of New Hampshire Department of Safety, Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Management (HSEM) to Update the City's Local Emergency Operations Plan. The Finance Committee met on April 28th and voted to recommend approval of this Grant Agreement to full City Council. I have attached copies of the Grant Agreement as well as a Memorandum from Chief Kramlinger. The Fire Chief outlines the entire Grant process moving from Emergency Generator Grant to this Grant. Attached is a copy of the State approved Consultant's proposal that we intend to use for this Project, if approved.

B. Resolution No. 47-20: To Authorize the City to Use Funding from the City Parks and Parks Facilities Rehabilitation/Reconstruction Capital Reserve Fund as a Portion of the City's Match to a Land and Water Conservation Grant for Improvements to Jules Bisson Park. The Finance Committee met on April 28th and voted to recommend this authorization to withdraw funds. Attached are copies of the information provided to the Finance Committee.

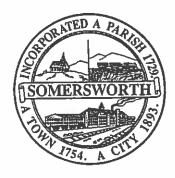
City Manager's Items (under section 11 of Agenda)

A. Informational Items.

- 1. City Budgets. I have attached copies of information that I provided to the Finance Committee to assist in their discussion regarding potential COVID-19 Budget impacts. As you will read in the recent meeting minutes, presently our FY2020 Budget is in excellent shape. The greater concern lies with any action the State might take in State Revenues earmarked for our Community. The Finance Committee's consensus was to recommend we address any needed Revenue adjustments to the approved FY2021 Budget when we have more information from the State, which could be a few months away.
- 2. Capital Projects & Staffing. It was the consensus of the Finance Committee for Staff to continue to move forward with Capital Projects as well as all planned hiring. As such, I will be introducing Bond Resolutions for Cemetery Road and a new Fire Station in the coming months, pending Mayoral approval.
- 3. Brush & Bagged Leave Pick-up.
 - a. Brush will be picked up the third week in May (May 18). You must call 692-4266 by Friday, May 15 to be added to the pickup list.
 - b. Bagged leaves will be picked up the fourth week in May (May 25). You do not have to call ahead for bagged leaves pickup.

Re: CMAQ Progress to date

The City was the recipient of a Grant Round 2017 Congestion Mitigation & Air Quality Grant. Our project includes a signal system optimization of the High Street/Rte. 108 Corridor in order to improve traffic flow, streamline intersections, and provide for pedestrian improvements. The project includes upgrade cabinets, video detection as well as pedestrian signals and ADA ramps at 6 intersections:

- 1) High Street (Rte. 9) at Blackwater Road/Indigo Hill Road
- 2) High Street (Rte. 9) at Stackpole Road
- 3) High Street (Rte. 9) at Walton Way
- 4) High Street (Rte. 9) at Andrews Road
- 5) High Street (Rte. 9) at Tri City Road
- 6) High Street (Rte. 9) at Kelwyn Drive

To date the City has hired Sebago Technics as our consultant Engineer. Sebago has:

- a) Identified street level infrastructure
- b) Reviewed Central Management System Software options
- c) Designed the communications network between signals for timing optimization
- d) Researched Right-of-Way considerations

The next step is to hold the local concerns meeting and then finalize the engineering study for submission to DOT.

Re: High Street (Route 9) Corridor Traffic Signal Improvements

Dear Mayor Hilliard and Members of the City Council,

Sebago Technics, Inc is pleased to present this summary of the ongoing study and design of the High Street (Route 9) Corridor Traffic Signal Improvement Project. The purpose of the May 4th City Council and Public Meeting is to present the current status of the project and receive feedback from officials and the public on existing issues of concern in the project area. This project is being administered as a NHDOT Local Public Agency (LPA) project using federal Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) improvement program funding.

The City seeks to upgrade the existing traffic signal and pedestrian infrastructure at the following six intersections along High Street.

- 1. High Street at Blackwater Road/Indigo Hill Road
- 2. High Street at Stackpole Road
- 3. High Street at Walton's Way/Commercial Drive
- 4. High Street at Andrews Road (Target)
- 5. High Street at Tri-City Plaza
- 6. High Street at Kelwyn Drive

Currently the project is in the Engineering Study phase, which will be followed by preliminary/final design and ultimately construction which is currently scheduled for 2021. The objective of this study, which will be submitted to NHDOT for review, is to assess the existing conditions and recommend options to achieve the project goals of improving vehicular traffic flow and to provide for a safer pedestrian experience along the corridor.

The study examines the following items specific to each intersection:

- Vehicular and Pedestrian traffic signal infrastructure, including cabinets and components,
 Emergency Vehicle Preemption (EVP), and Accessible Pedestrian Signal (APS) buttons
- Communications between the project intersections along High Street
- Communications from High Street to a central management system at City Hall
- and, pedestrian curb ramps to meet current ADA requirements.

Over the past two months we have been coordinating with City Staff to produce this study. The first task was to complete a field inventory of the existing traffic signal and pedestrian equipment. From this inventory observed deficiencies were noted. Based on this inventory of existing conditions and noted deficiencies, a proposed scope of action was developed. This includes items such as upgrading the traffic signal controllers, providing remote communications to modify and monitor the signals, and providing ADA compliant pedestrian facilities. Once these improvements are implemented, it is also critical to

maintain the system, both in terms of infrastructure but also monitoring traffic patterns and adjusting the way the signals are programmed to operate to continuously provide efficient operations.

Included for your information are conceptual plans of the six project intersections highlighting the existing conditions and the currently proposed improvements.

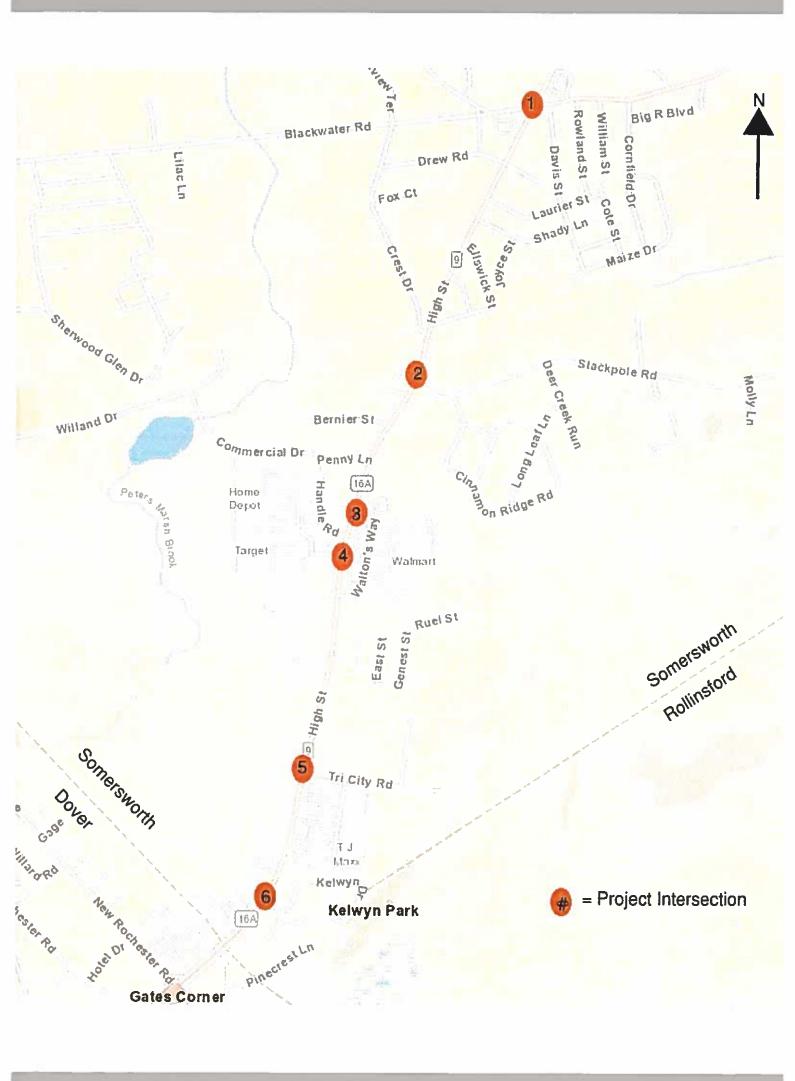

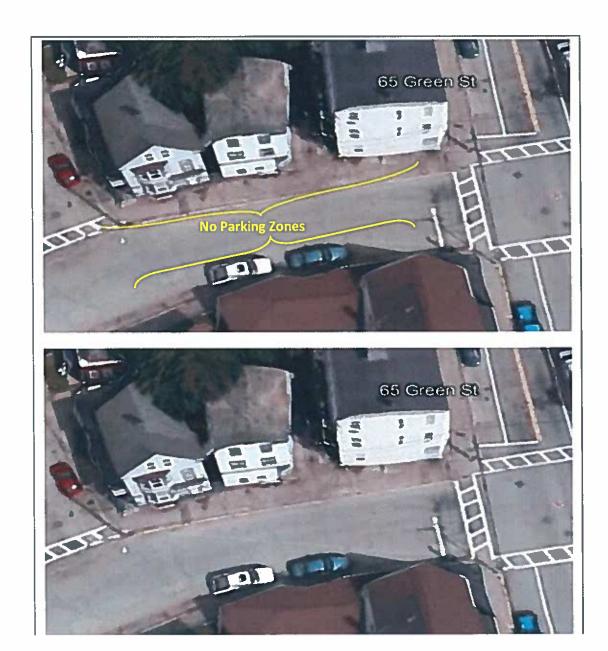
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SOMERSWORTH THAT the Ordinances of the City of Somersworth, as amended, be further amended as follows:

Amend Police Offenses, Section 13. 3.1-D, No Parking Anytime, by adding:

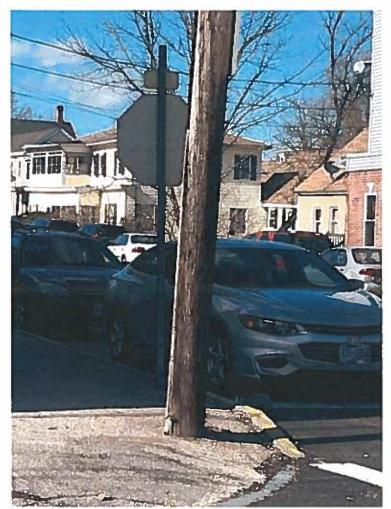
Franklin Street, approximately 100 feet westerly from Green Street, on the south side of the street (to the opposite side of the road from the intersection with Silver Street)

This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage.

- Amend City Ordinances to prohibit parking on Franklin westerly from Green Street. This approach is a slight bend in the road and line of sight to the intersection is often compromised by on street parking. Moreover, the on street parking makes larger vehicle passage difficult such as COAST bus, School Busses, etc. Suggested ordinance language attached. I would like the ordinance introduced at our next Council Meeting.
- 2. Better mark the road for no parking areas or add signs at the intersection. As show in the picture here cars are often parked illegally but there are no signs or marking indicating otherwise. I have included suggested marking plan attached.

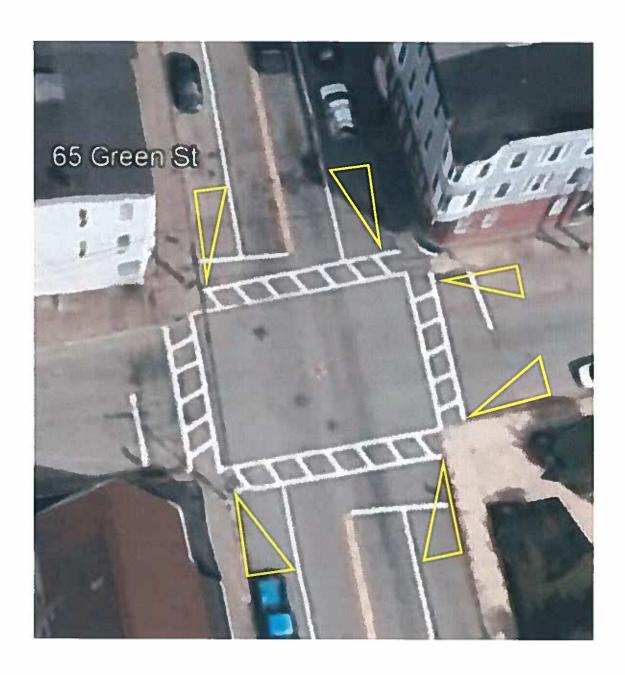


Picture of 65 Green Street, Cars parked right up to intersection

WHEREAS, the City Council adopted Resolution No. 38-20 to authorize the City Manager to enter into a grant agreement with the New Hampshire Department of Safety to acquire a generator for emergency power for the public safety radio transmitter located at 17 Grand Street; and

WHEREAS, as a condition of that grant the City is required to update the Local Emergency Operations Plan (LEOP); and

WHEREAS, the City has been notified of the availability of a NH HSEM grant available to complete the update of the City's LEOP; and

WHEREAS, the grant requires a 50% match that can be provided by the City utilizing in-kind services,

Subject: EMPG (Generator) Grant Timeline/Overview Synopsis

- Mr Manager, the City of Somersworth has been awarded an Emergency Management Performance Grant (EMPG) in the amount of \$17,800 to purchase a propane fired generator in order to provide a reliable backup electrical power source for the City's public safety radio repeater located on top of the former Hilltop School.
- 2. The EMPG program has a 50% Federal and 50% local match (cash or in-kind). The EMPG rules allow us to use \$8900 of the \$52,545 FY20 CIP funding for Fire Department portable radios as an "in-kind" or "soft" match. The generator actually costs \$8900 but the grant is written for \$17,800 (\$8900 + \$8900) to reflect the "in-kind" or "soft" match by the City.
- 3. The Grant Agreement provided by the State of New Hampshire Homeland Security and Emergency Management (HSEM) was approved by the City Council on 16 March, 2020, signed by you on 20 March, 2020, and forwarded electronically by me to NH Department of Safety, Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Management (HSEM) on 20 March, 2020.
- 4. The Grant Agreement is currently at the HSEM Business Office awaiting approval. HSEM has confirmed that our submission is accurate and complete. However, with the COVID-19 emergency, the approval process has slowed. Once HSEM has completely processed our submission we can expect approval and allocation of funds.
- 5. Second Source Generators, the company that provided the quote, is operating during the COVID-19 Emergency. On 3 April, 2020, Mr Tim Cricton indicated that the turnaround time to complete the project (once authorized) is approximately 2-3 weeks. Second Source is committed to the project and looking forward to completing the work. Generator estimate is attached.

- 6. The concrete pad and conduits (electrical and natural gas) provided by Chinburg Properties (developer of the former Hilltop School) are in place and ready. Picture attached.
- 7. Agreements may be in place to pay for the natural gas and electricity associated with the generator but I am unable to find any written documentation. I will pursue this matter with Development Services Director Shanna Saunders.
- 8. A condition by NH HSEM for the generator EMPG is that we update the City's Emergency Operations Plan (EOP). HSEM will provide another EMPG that fully funds the EOP consultant's fee of \$4500. See attached consultant fee estimate. The City's 50% local "in-kind" or "soft" match is the time City staff contributes to the EOP development. As you may recall, the initial documents for the EOP EMPG are with you for review and signatures.
- 9. In summary, the EMPGs for the repeater emergency generator (Hilltop School) and associated EOP update are on track and moving along albeit at a slower pace because of the COVID-19 Emergency.
- 10. I stand ready to answer any questions or address any issues.

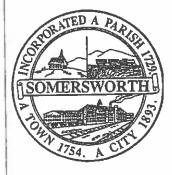

We have issued an RFP for the playground equipment. Of the two proposals received, we like UltiPlay's proposal of \$45,816. (the other proposal was of similar cost with less elements) This proposal will provide a multi faceted upgraded playground structure with three slides, as well as an ADA accessible detached element and several Nature/River themed elements such as fish and logs. The quote includes a border and ADA ramp as well. Woodchips would come out of the DPW Parks repair budget.

We also issued an RFP for a gazebo and received a proposal of \$27,449 from TCD Construction for a 16 x 16, ADA accessible octagonal gazebo. The references on TCD Construction were stellar. The other proposal received was more than twice the cost.

The total expenditure on these two elements is \$73,265. Which leaves \$16,735 for the new gravel parking lot and ADA accessible walkway.

Hello, Managers:

Here is a summary of some of the important points from the Governor-Mayors call this morning:

- COVID-19 numbers are improving every day but are not significantly better. There is concern about NH's
 proximity to MA due to their very high numbers. But the NH health care system holding up well and there
 is plenty of capacity.
- New testing locations are up and running. Anyone who has symptoms should be tested.
- It was acknowledged that there is some confusion about the expiration date of the SOE and of the EOs. SOE has to be updated every 21 days; he will keep doing so indefinitely. Stay-at-home expires on Monday; he will likely extend that, but with some flexibility. There is a press conference tomorrow at 3:00.
- A question was asked about whether CARES Act money would be available before June 30 (start of fiscal
 year) and the answer was yes. A question was also asked about whether the governor's office was looking
 into TANs to assist municipalities, and the governor said he would. (Side note: NHMA is working with the
 Bond Bank, DRA, and the state to push for the state to implement authority needed to allow municipalities
 to access the Federal Reserve's <u>Municipal Liquidity Facility</u>—please stay tuned this issue.)
- The governor will continue the flexibility with 91-A (presumably referring to EO #12). (Side note: please see the recent letter sent by NHMA to the governor.)
- Commissioner Edelblut is looking into guidance to potentially allow school districts to hold graduations.
- There was a question about funding for elections. The state has \$3.2 million for election support. If \$3.2 million isn't sufficient, we can provide additional money. There was also a comment about creating additional polling places and perhaps drive-up voting.
- Guidance will be issued on pools, parks, playgrounds, and beaches in a week or two. They are also looking
 into a guidance document on summer camps.
