asset has always been and will continue to be the people who proudly call and define themselves as Hilltoppers.

Somersworth has within six years gone from wandering the trail with a confused sense of direction, to becoming a model of governing, while celebrating and embracing diversity, and reinvesting and believing in itself. The elements to our success were never lost or abandoned, they were instead forgotten. Forgotten by those who believed that for Somersworth to once again become the giant of the seacoast, a transformation to something else was necessary. Those who believed that for Somersworth to compete we must become and follow the lead of our neighbors, Dover, Rochester or Portsmouth. For what we sought out to create in 1729 radiates today in the new energy level, excitement and determination to continue envisioning, creating and constructing a community were all can live safely, be supported, find common ground, and be celebrated.

History is filled with the stories of civilizations and communities' time of opportunities and missed opportunities, leaving future generations to ponder and interpret why decisions were made or negated. Ones greatest moment is knowing when their time has arrived, their time to climb, progress, succeed. Knowing when it is their time to envision, endeavor, commitment and continue "On the Move!" Our Hilltop city no longer needs to forecast into the future when our time will come, for our time has arrived, and we will no longer await for the right moment or opportunity to create our "Bright Future", for Somersworth now is our moment "Now is our Time!"

"*Now is Our Time*" to continue the progress which has been made at reinvigorating our downtown center and commerce areas. We must aggressively market all that is right and intriguing about our 10 square mile community. We must with confidence seek every opportunity to attract and welcome the businesses, we desire. Gone must be the days when we adhere to the concept that with little too no effort they will come. We must instead, with the same level of commitment and energy which has set forth the continuation of our journey of success; create, envision, market and seek opportunities which will attract investors and entrepreneurs to Somersworth.

A school system is the first indication of a community's commitment to oneself, its wellbeing and willingness of investment and sacrifice towards a <u>"Bright</u> <u>Future"</u>. Progressive schools attract businesses and families who will continue to believe and embrace Somersworth. We must hold steady to our commitment to greatness within our school system, though seeking every opportunity available to create 21st century educational experiences for all of our students. <u>"Now is our Time"</u> to continue the financial support we have made over the last 6 years, of passing school budgets which reflect our Hilltopper values towards supporting 21st century education opportunities, while building schools which are nationally recognized for their holistic approach towards growing a student's body, mind

"<u>Now is our Time</u>" to continue with the due diligence of the *SAU56 Withdrawal Commission* and explore all options which will allow Somersworth to make its own independent decisions regarding the governing of their education system. While full autonomy comes at a cost, we must not hesitate nor be fearful of allowing our community the final step of achieving its own voice in steering its own destiny.

The Somersworth of 2019 has altered in its appearance and growth since most of our childhoods. Today the Somersworth we live in is home to business and shopping plazas where farms once stood. Open space and land which once was habitat to species we rarely came in contact with, are now housing developments to new generations of Hilltoppers, forcing the displaced deer, turkeys, and other wild life into our backyards, and onto our streets. While our economic progress is and must continue to be a top priority of our community, so must sustaining and conserving its natural resources. We must continue to seek balance between development and maintaining sustainable and conservation practices which protect all natural resources and species for generations to come.

Within the next several months I will naming members of both of these bodies to embark on the creation of a 10 year annual plan adopted by the City Council entitled <u>"Preserve Somersworth"</u>. This environmentally friendly plan will ensure Somersworth continues to focus on the balance between development and preservation, while exploring and adopting sustainable practices in its government, school and community.

We must continue our unwavering commitment towards our first responders. Our Hilltopper heroes, Police, Fire, EMS, reaffirm each day that without hesitation, they would be willing to lay down their life, for the life of a fellow Hilltopper. <u>"Now is our Time"</u> to ensure through our practices they are rewarded with competitive salaries and benefits and have access to the tools and equipment necessary to keep us safe.

By the conclusion of this Councils term, let us vote to finalize the construction of a state of the art Fire Station facility, have our Police Department at full force, creating new officer positions if the demand is warranted and continue to support EMS services who are dedicated and committed to Somersworth.

Since the first volleys of American Independence were fired at Lexington and Concord our American Veterans have continued to answer the call, defending the values of freedom and Liberty throughout the world. Somersworth Veterans throughout our history have and continue to serve our nation with the pride and valor which brings honor to our Hilltop City.

The Veterans Parks Commission under the leadership of Councilor Dumont and Commission members have adopted the preliminary designs for a new Veterans Park which will create a place of remembrance and recognition that all of our Veterans deserve.

Today the Pines Splash Pad, walking trails and Kayak launches cater to the needs of a community's desire for wellness practices. <u>"Now is our Time"</u> to not only sustain our support for park upgrades, but explore and create new recreation opportunities for all residents. Under the watchful eyes of Councilor Cameron as the new Chair of the Council Recreation Committee I have full confidence that recreation will continue to have a <u>"Bright Future"</u> in our city.

The Noble Pines Baseball Field has been recognized as one of the best Baseball diamonds in the state and has taken on the characteristics of a Norman Rockwell painting during games, celebrating Americas favorite past time, at the highest gathering spot in our community. Sadly at our flagship park, baseball is limited only to the daylight hours. As the saying goes "If you build it, they will come", so over the next several months Council Witham and I will be seeking and exploring all options of making "night time baseball games" a living reality at the Noble Pines.

With the same dream and determination that illuminated Memorial Field for football, I call upon all baseball lovers to help us bring evening baseball games to the Hilltop City.

On equal footing with a reputable school system for attracting businesses and families to Somersworth, is an updated and well maintain infrastructure. Over the past six years with the guidance and commitment of the Public Works and Environment Chair Councilor Sprague our Council has embraced an aggressive approach to upgrading our streets, roads and infrastructure. 



From your Local Fire Department 692-3457

- Spring is the time to clean-up garages, basements and yards. Lubricants and hazardous materials can be disposed of during advertised collection days dedicated solely to the disposal of these items. Otherwise metal and electronic items can be dropped off at the DPW yard once stickers for disposal have been purchased at City Hall for \$4 per item.
- Spring also means that citizens will be burning their downed tree limbs and garden preparation materials. A Permit is required by the State of New Hampshire for such activities and that Permit can be obtained at the Fire Department. Unless it is raining outside, permitted burning cannot start until 5pm each day.
- The City has the need of additional call firefighters. A call firefighter receives certification as a Firefighter I/II in the state of New Hampshire. He/she usually is employed in another vocation but responds to emergencies in Somersworth (and to our neighbors) should the occasion arise when we need additional help at an emergency scene. Apply at the Fire Department or at Human Resources in City Hall.

BAGGED LEAVES AND BRUSH PICKUP

Brush will be picked up the third weeks in April and May. You must call 692-4266 by Friday, April 12th and/or Friday, May 17th to be added to the pickup list. Please have your brush curbside no later than 7:00 am on Monday, April 15th and/or Monday, May 20th for pickup. Brush can be up to five (5) inches in

diameter and ten (10) feet long. PLEASE NOTE: Brush pickup is limited to 20 minutes per stop. Any remaining brush and cleanup of debris is the responsibility of the property owner. *The April collection will also include any Christmas trees that were buried under the snow. Please have them curbside with your brush!*

Bagged leaves will be picked up the fourth weeks in April and May You

do not have to call ahead for bagged leaves pickup. Please have leaves curbside no later than 7:00am on your trash pickup day the weeks of April 22nd and/or May 27th. Leaves and grass clippings must be in brown paper leaf bags, sold at many local stores.




Highway Crews to Prepare for Spring Work Details


