Driver Shortage Forces COAST to Modify and Suspend Routes

Due to an acute shortage of CDL-qualified operators, COAST regrettably has announced that they must suspend Saturday service on all fixed routes, ADA paratransit, and other demand response services, and must reduce the weekday frequency of service on Routes 40/43 (Portsmouth/Newington) and Routes 1/33 (Dover/Somersworth/Berwick). Saturday Route 7 On Demand service will shift to Tuesdays for the time being.

These changes take effect beginning Saturday, May 21.

"We sincerely apologize for this inconvenience and want to reassure everyone that we are doing everything in our power to resolve the situation," remarked Rad Nichols, COAST Executive Director. Nichols added, "Like many of the other businesses and nonprofits in our communities, COAST's ability to fulfill our mission is being impacted by economy wide staffing shortages. We are intently focused on regaining control of this situation as quickly as possible so that we can fulfill our promise to the communities, businesses, non-profits, and people we serve. We appreciate the region's patience and loyalty."

COAST is encouraging anyone with a CDL-license that wants to work for an employer that is focused on serving the community and providing an essential service, to please visit their website to learn more about the driving opportunities that are currently available and to apply.

Nichols emphasized, "COAST has always recognized that our staff is at the heart of what we do. We have worked tirelessly over the years to build a reputation as a positive, professional, and team-oriented place to work and we offer competitive compensation that includes a generous and diverse benefits package. Our staff come to work every day knowing they are serving their community and helping the Greater Seacoast to be a better place to live and work."

SEPTEMBER 13, 2022 PRIMARY ELECTION NEWS SUPERVISORS OF THE CHECKLIST IN SESSION, MAY 31, 2022

The Supervisors of the Checklist will meet on Tuesday, May 31, 2022, from 7 to 7:30 p.m., at the City Clerk's office at City Hall, 1 Government Way

During this session, supervisors will register new voters, change party affiliation, addresses and names, and make other necessary corrections to the checklist. This is also the last opportunity for voters to change party affiliation before the state primary election to be held Tuesday, Sept. 13, 2022.

DEADLINE TO CHANGE PARTY AFFILIATION IS MAY 31, 2022

The last day a registered voter can change their party affiliation before Sept. 13, 2022 state primary is May 31, 2022. Per state law, voters may not change their party affiliation 90 days before a primary.

Voters domiciled in Somersworth may change their party affiliation at the City Clerk's Office, or at any scheduled meeting of the supervisors of the checklist except for during the period of time between the first day of the filing period for the primary election and the date of the primary election itself.

CHECK PARTY AFFILIATION STATUS


Voters who have provided their date of birth on a voter registration form may go to the Secretary of State's <u>Registered Voter web link</u> to check their political party affiliation status. The person must enter their first name, last name, town or city, date of birth, and complete the security entry. If the name, town or city, and date of birth are the same as what was provided in their voter registration form, their name, voter ID, and party affiliation, if any, will be displayed.

CANDIDATE FILING PERIOD

The filing period for candidates seeking elected office in 2022 is from June 1 to 10, 2022. Find information about running for office at the Secretary of State's <u>Running for Office</u> page.

In 1962, President Kennedy declared Peace Officers Memorial Day May 15th of each year. This year, and every year, we remember our police fallen heroes. Donald Kowalski was a patrolman with the Somersworth Police Department when he was killed in the line of duty on September 4, 1979. Officer Kowalski died in a vehicle crash. He had positioned his cruiser in a roadblock when it was struck by a suspect driving a stolen vehicle. He was 25 years old

Summer Pet Safety

It takes only minutes for a pet left in a vehicle on a warm day to succumb to heatstroke and suffocation. Most people don't realize how hot it can get in a parked car on a balmy day. However, on a 78 degree day, temperatures in a car parked in the shade can exceed 90 degrees -- and hit a scorching 160 degrees if parked in the sun!

Even when the outside air temperature is in the 60's, temperatures inside some vehicles can reach the danger zone on bright, sunny days. So many experts recommend not leaving pets or children in parked cars even for short periods if the temperature is in the 60's or higher.

Rolling down a window or parking in the shade doesn't guarantee protection either, since temperatures can still climb into the danger zone. And if the window is rolled down sufficiently, the pet can escape.

Animals are not able to sweat like humans do. Dogs cool themselves by panting and by sweating through their paws. If they have only overheated air to breathe, animals can collapse, suffer brain damage and possibly die of heatstroke. Just 15 minutes can be enough for an animal's body temperature to climb from a normal 102.5 to deadly levels that will damage the nervous and cardiovascular systems, often leaving the animal comatose, dehydrated and at risk of permanent impairment or death.

Leave your dog at home on warm days.

A safety message from the Fire Chief's Office

Learning from the Recent Past A Safety Message from the Fire Chief's Office

Spanish philosopher George Santayana famously said that "Those who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it". In the interest of not repeating the past, this month's column offers a few safety lessons based on recent events.

Electrical Outlets: Across the nation, hundreds of people are killed every year due to electrical fires in their homes. In fact, electrical fires are one of the leading causes of death for people over the age of 65. To prevent electrical fires, do not overload outlets. Plug anything that requires a large draw of current directly into an outlet - not a power strip or extension cord. Charge battery powered items such as laptops or cellphones on a hard, noncombustible surface - not a bed, couch, or pillow. Instances of charging mobile devices on soft, combustible surfaces have been the possible cause of building fires.

Dig Safe: Staying with theme of electricity, a two-person crew in a neighboring state was recently shocked while paving a residential driveway when the power equipment they were using touched live electrical wires. Both workers received burns. In a similar way, people digging in their yard are shocked or electrocuted when contacting buried electrical lines. When using power equipment, ladders, or cutting trees, stay well clear of any overhead electrical wires. If planning to dig with any possibility of buried electrical lines or other utilities, contact dig safe before starting the excavation.

Storms: Lightning is one of the top storm-related killers in the United States. According to the National Weather Service, about 20 Americans die every year from lightning with hundreds more being injured. Fishing is the most common activity for those struck by lightning. If you are out on the water with an approaching storm, head for the shore as quickly as possible and seek shelter. Have a healthy respect for the distance that lighting can travel as the proverbial "bolt out of the blue" can occur miles from the storm's center.

Households Chemicals: Improperly mixing household chemicals can create deadly fumes or start a fire. Recently, a homeowner in a neighboring state mixed Simple Green and Clorox Bleach and was overcome by the resulting fumes requiring transport to a hospital. A second incident occurred when someone accidently combined towels covered in acetone and bleach. The reaction of these two chemicals caused a fire. Only use chemical products in accordance with the manufactures instructions and use extreme caution to not mix different chemicals when disposing of unused or waste products.



Rocky Hill Road Culvert Replacement to Occur Mid-Summer

City Council awarded a contract to Wickson Construction to replace a culvert located on Rocky Hill Road, close to

the intersection with Winter Street and Maple Street. The project also involves replacing an old failing corrugated metal culvert and a segment of water and sewer lines in the vicinity of the culvert. The project will involve a temporary road closure from first week in July through the beginning of October in this area. Look for further details on the road closure and detour plans in June.

Metal Pick-up: 2nd Tuesday of each Month

When - next Curbside Collection: Tuesday, June 14th

How: Call Public Works **no later than 3:00 pm on Monday, June 13th**, place curbside with the proper number of Bulky Waste Stickers on each item. Typical TV's require three (3) stickers - \$12.00 and PC's require one (1) sticker - \$4.00.

Residents may also opt to drop off metal and electronic items with proper bulky waste stickers at the Public Works Facility located at 18 Lilac Lane from 7:30 am-2:30 pm Monday –Friday. *Note that weather emergencies may delay collection.*

Curbside MSW/Household Garbage & Recycling Collection

City trash bags and recycling containers must be at the curbside no later than 7:00

am & no sooner than the evening before your designated collection day.

As a reminder – Trash and Recycling Collection for the week of July 4th will be delayed one day for Independence Day. Monday, July 4th collection will take place on Tuesday, July 5th, Tuesday collection will take place on Wednesday, July 6th and Wednesday collection will take place on Thursday, July 7th.

Malley Farm Facility

Malley Farm is now open for disposal of brush and leaves, Monday – Friday 7:30am – 2:30pm and Saturday and Sunday 8:00am-6:00pm. Please note: Any Contractor serving a Somersworth residence with leaves and brush hauling, will need to obtain a permit from Public Works to dump at Malley Farm. Root balls and wood larger than 5" in diameter and 10' in length are not permitted. Please call the Public Works Department at 603-692-4266 for further information.



Use Care when Putting Recycling out on Windy Days

Windy days can quickly take recycling items on the street for weekly pickup and blow them around. Per city ordinance, residents are responsible for removing any remaining debris within 24 hours of trash and recycling collection. Community Services urges City residents to use extra caution when putting out recycling items on windy days to help keep Somersworth beautiful.

Here are a few tips to consider when putting items out on the street.

 \cdot **Don't put items out too early.** During windy weather, consider waiting to put out bins on the morning of pickup instead of the night before.

 \cdot **Don't overfill.** When items are overflowing from the bin, it's easier for the wind to catch them and blow things onto the street.

• Place heavier items on top. Putting lighter things at the bottom and placing heavier items on top will help keep items more secure in the bins when it becomes windy.

Community Building Through Farm to School

Connecting to our community has been a mission of Somersworth Farm to School since its early days in 2016. The pandemic surely isolated us all, and sidelined Farm to School completely during remote schooling and beyond. But good things come to those who wait, and Somersworth schools' current administration has thrown full support behind Farm to School initiatives and programming. Because of this, community connections to our schools are bearing fruit at a steady clip this spring.

Our Grade 3-5 Maple Wood Elementary students are reaping the benefits of the Seacoast Area Mobile Market(SAMM) Van's newly offered educational outreach programs. SAMM Education Coordinator Celeste Gingras visits predominantly elementary level schools to educate on farming, nutrition, soil health, and even delves into the indigenous peoples of our area- the Abenaki, the Penacook, and the Wabanaki. Though we've linked SAMM's programming to elementary health and PE curriculum, its tendrils reach many disciplines in our students' academic life.

Does Somersworth have community gardens? The answer is yes! Located down Malley Farm Road just past the ball fields and before the leaf and brush drop-off entrance, these plots are available to "lease" **for free** to any Somersworth resident. Most are 10'x10', with some exceptions. This is an exciting year at the Somersworth Community Gardens, as Home Depot donated time, labor, tools, and an entire tool shed to expand and increase the number of plots. Given the waitlist last year, this is a welcome addition. Also exciting is the introduction of students to the Community Gardens to use as an "expanded campus." Students from Somersworth Middle School started two of the 10'x10' plots. These will be continued and maintained by the Somersworth Youth Connection summer camp program, the Somersworth Recreation Dept. summer camp program, and a handful of educators and their students who wish to use this space within their curriculum in the fall and beyond.


