SRPC has received a \$30,000 - 2018 New Hampshire Children's Health Foundation (HNH) Grant. As part of the scope of work for this Grant, SRPC will compile a regional recreational facilities GIS map. SRPC will partner with our City specifically - to develop data and maps to create a customized recreation accessibility plan for the City.

### Happy New Year from the Development Services Department

The Development Services Department staff (the Offices of Planning & Economic Development, Code Enforcement and Recreation), are writing to let

you know that 2019 will be an exciting year for Somersworth!

We are working on several revitalization projects that will brighten and enhance our charming historic downtown and more. Infrastructure will continue with High Street sidewalk upgrades. Jules Bisson Park will undergo a complete renovation. In addition, intersection upgrades are planned throughout the High Street corridor and we are preparing for complete streets projects on several streets across the City.

Most notable, we plan to issue a Request for Proposal (RFP), for the Somersworth Plaza parking lot redevelopment project in the Fall of 2019. This is one of our most significant endeavors of the last several years. The Plaza parking lot is a City owned property that has significant potential for redevelopment to benefit both the City's economy and the walkability of Downtown. **2019 Alarm Permit Renewal Notices** will be mailed out in December. If you own a fire alarm or security system alarm, ordinances require you to obtain a permit. To renew your permit the fee is \$10.00 if paid before the end of January, 2019 or \$20.00 after. If the alarm is for a residence and you are 65 or older, your permit is free. #### Live Scan

Somersworth PD is now collecting fingerprints with Live Scan, an Automated Fingerprint Indexing System, (AFIS). The system collects and electronically submits fingerprints to an FBI database, which in turn sends identification and criminal record information back to the Police Department in minutes instead of hours or days. AFIS is a welcome addition to the Department that aids in investigations while making an Officer's job safer and more efficient.



### Snow Emergencies Winter Parking Ban

Snow Emergencies can be called at any time, day or night. During Snow Emergencies, a Parking Ban is in effect. Always be aware of overnight weather forecasts and have alternative parking plans when snow is predicted. Your vehicle can be towed during a Snow Emergency and

you will have to pay the tow charge to get it back. The purpose of the parking ban is to enable Public Works to safely maintain the roads. This means sometimes there will be a Snow Emergency declared even when it is no longer snowing. Snow emergencies are announced on the following stations: WTSN, WOKQ, WERZ, WSHK, WHEB, WMUR Channel 9 and Local Cable Station Channel 22. Be prepared for winter storms. The New Hampshire Homeland Security and Emergency Management Agency has a lot of good information at <a href="https://www.readynh.gov">www.readynh.gov</a> so pay it a visit!

- Colder weather means that heating appliances will be working longer and harder. Furnaces should be serviced once a year to insure that optimal performance is being generated. In this light, those who have power venters attached to their oil or gas furnaces that exit through the basement wall to the outside should be sure that they are NOT blocked by snow and ice. If they are, carbon monoxide poisoning within the structure is a real possibility.
- Chimneys also should be cleaned out to prevent creosote build-up in the flue which can cause a chimney fire. Fires in older un-lined flues can cause serious house fires as the flames are able to penetrate into the wood framing of the home. It is wise to burn the initial fire each day very hot and not to use soft woods if possible.
- Homeowners who have fire hydrants adjacent to their property are asked to help the City and shovel out in front of them after snow storms. The Fire Department and the DPW appreciate your assistance.

## Road repair upgrades to continue into the Spring

The City will continue its FY2019 road repairs program this upcoming spring, starting in mid-April and continuing through the end of May. There are several upcoming streets that will experience a mill and overlay treatment, including

High St. (from Blackwater Rd. to South St.), Tates Brook Road, and Garden Street, as well as a final overlay on Horne St. and the new shoulder on High St. between Verona St. and Bartlett St. Please note that a five-year excavation moratorium will be placed on each street as soon as it has been paved. If you have any need to install a new or replacement utility connection on these streets, please arrange for a contractor to complete any work prior to the road repairs and unless an emergency, after the winter moratorium is lifted on April 15, 2019. Contact the Department of Public Works and Utilities at 692-4266 for scheduling details and to apply for a City trench permit.

### **New Year Day Holiday Collection Notice**

Reminder that Residential curbside collection of trash and recycling will run on its normal schedule on, Monday, December 31, New Year's Eve. However residential curbside collection of trash and recycling will not occur on New Year's Day, Tuesday January 1; a one-day delay for the balance of the service week will take effect. Tuesday's collection will be on Wednesday, and Wednesday's collection will be on Thursday.

### Winter Driving Alerts

Reminder to continue to monitor weather conditions for impacts on City streets and sidewalks. Stay connected to City news alerts on parking bans, trash and recycling delays and or public meeting cancelations due to weather by signing up for the City Manager's news and alerts e blasts. ### Malley Farm - Open temporarily as conditions allow

The Department of Public Works has reopened the Malley Farm for the disposal of leafs, brush and Christmas Trees as conditions allow. The current weather pattern has allowed the Department to return to standard service hours which is: Monday -Friday- 7:30am-2:30pm


Saturday and Sunday: 8:00 am to 6:00 pm

Winter storm emergency responses will impact this access and likely will be closed after the next plowable snow event. Check with Public Works officials at 603-692-4266 for access updates.

### **Christmas Tree Drop off locations**

Public Works will be picking up Christmas trees the week of January 7 and 14, 2019 subject to any weather delays. Please make sure the tree is accessible and free of all ornaments and garland, and also free of ice and snow.

Somersworth residents may dispose of their Christmas Trees by dropping off the trees at the Department of Public Works and Utilities Facility located at 18 Lilac Lane; a drop off location has been set up to the left of



Residents may also transport Christmas Trees to the Malley Farm brush and yard waste site to the extent the Malley Farm is opened.

Residents reminded to NOT have direct sump pump discharges into City sanitary sewer manholes, stormwater catch basins, sidewalks or streets.

Public Works Highway crews have noticed some properties have roof downspouts, foundation drains, and area drains that discharge ground water directly into nearby catch basins, sanitary sewer manholes or streets and sidewalks. This is in violation of the City's Sewer Use Ordinance (8A.21 section 10) and can contribute to overcharging the basin or sewer manhole and or hazardous streets or sidewalk conditions.



This creates ice and freeze conditions that are hazardous to pedestrians and motorists, and may carry pollutants into the City's storm sewer system. This has been particularly noticeable during cold weather conditions where the discharge flow will freeze on streets and sidewalks. Please contact the Department of Public Works Highway Division at 692-4266 if you have questions or need additional information on how to redirect this runoff from your property.

### Historic District Commission's Featured House



This featured house is a mix of two building styles both common in the late 1800's - Italianate and Gothic Revival. The wide eaves, tall narrow windows with crown molding, and arched windows are all common Italianate characteristics

The Gothic Revival details are much rarer, found on maybe three other buildings, within the Historic District. These include the steep roof and pointed arches as seen in the corner trim and front door details.
