



Somersworth Earns Energy Efficiency Award

The State Department of Environmental Services awarded Somersworth's Wastewater Treatment Plant with a 2019 Energy Efficient Award for being one of New Hampshires's energy champions. NHDES noted the plant's efficiency while bestowing the award, because Somersworth paced the State using 0.62 kilowatt hours for every pound of biological oxygen demand removed, but also because it did so in spite of the fact that the City's plant is more than 30 years old.

"Plant Chief Operator Jamie Wood and his team have once again proven how our 10-square-mile Hilltop City community continues to be the model of the 21st Century practices, said Mayor Dana Hilliard. They have reinforced through their practices how Somersworth is truly 'on the move'" The Hilltop City plant won the category based on pollutant loading.



<u>Fireworks</u>

The state of New Hampshire has rules and regulations governing the use of fireworks. These are promulgated by the State Fire Marshal. Most important among these are:

- A PERMIT must be obtained from the Fire Department
- The landowner MUST give permission to use fireworks
- Only those 21 and older should possess and use fireworks
- M-80s, cherry bombs and certain bottle rockets are illegal in New Hampshire and SHOULD NEVER BE USED
- Small firecrackers and certain bottle rockets have been legalized by the Legislature and do NOT require a Permit. Check with your Fireworks provider to be sure which ones are legal without a Permit
- Eye protection by those igniting the fireworks is recommended
- Light only ONE device at a time
- Keep spectators away
- Ignite ONLY outdoors and AWAY FROM OTHER FIREWORKS AND COMBUSTIBLES
- Keep a fire extinguisher or garden hose handy just in case
 - Clean up debris later and any fireworks that failed to ignite. Soak these in water to disable them
- Call "9-1-1" for any incident no matter how small
- Contact the Fire Department if you are unsure of any procedure



Growing Food in our School - From the Food in our Schools

Somersworth's Conservation Commission Community Message



The Conservation Commission would like your assistance in preventing the spread of the invasive Japanese knotweed plant. The best means of eradication are smothering it and treatment with herbicide by licensed professionals. Please do not cut it (except by hand, and only if you are going to immediately burn

it), do not bury it, or move it. If you see stands of knotweed, please try to stay away from them, and keep pets away from them, to avoid inadvertently spreading parts of the plants via your feet.
