The Mayor's Corner

Closer yet Further Apart

Each generation will have the joy of owning the statement "things are a lot different than when I grew up".

For those of us that grew up in the world of MTV (back when they actually played music videos), the Cold War and the Berlin Wall, the world, nation, state and neighborhoods seems to have metaphysically gotten smaller. It's easy to forget that back then, to gain information on the state of national and world affairs one was subject to the clock as news was reported daily at 6pm and 11pm.

Local news ran on an afternoon cycle, and households anticipated a timely delivery of their newspaper. As a childhood paper boy, I must admit I often fell victim to the voice of the angry consumers' desire to have their Foster's Daily Democrat before 4pm. Their anger would often be reflected in a hard candy tip instead of hard cash.

The advent of the internet, social media and the launching of the 24 hour news cycle has made our world feel a lot smaller. The benefits to this access is unquestionable. We have become more exposed to the world we live in, gained

greater insight into ourselves, into others, into counter views and lifestyles which we may not have been accustomed to. Yet, despite the shrinking of the distance between ourselves and others, the gap has seemed to of somehow widen. Regardless of how small the world appears to have become, our level of understanding, civility, respect, and decency towards others, has eroded and continues to erode at an alarming rate.

While I am certainly in tune with the fact that I have reached my late forties and the vocabulary which encompasses it, there is universal truth in the statement "In my day". I will stand by my conviction, that "things have changed" in a negative direction since my youth. Although discontent is not something new to our society. In truth the formation of our independence was crafted around our discontent when we were poorly treated by our former motherland, England. Yet, with the dawn of Facebook, Twitter, and other social media platforms, our personal level of discontent has metamorphosed itself beyond vocalizing our First Amendment right of free speech, instead resulting in personal attacks upon the morals, ethics and character of our political leaders, government employees, police officers, firefighters, principals, teachers, friends and neighbors. The personal opinions we once harbored about professionals, friends, and neighbors, have moved from the privacy of our homes to the World Wide Web, where it is exposed and everyone has become a target, and forced to defend themselves.

Somewhere along the journey of technology, which was created to bring us closer, we have instead become further apart, altering the direction of becoming "thy brother's keeper" to becoming "thy brother's attacker". There is tremendous difference between applying high professional standards upon the individuals entrusted with responsibilities within our republic, and having an "open season" attack on individuals. Instead of progressing forward as a dignified human species with the technology we have created, we have reverted backwards to a culture similar to the one of 1692 Salem, Massachusetts. Call someone a witch on Facebook, or Tweet that they were dancing in the woods with the Devil, and they are immediately placed on the trail at the court of the World Wide Web and public opinion.

Somewhere along our journey, we have abandoned our decency and became uncaring to the fact that the people who we attack have families, children and careers. That they are sons and daughters, fathers and mothers, aunts and uncles. That by casting stones upon them, we are casting stones upon all who they are connected too, causing unwarranted and unjust pain. Somewhere, at some point, the technology which should have made us closer, has instead divided us and continues to break us further apart. It has led to the misconception that being part of a community includes unwarranted attacks on neighbors, co-workers, entrusted officials and friends.

With technology, and the Constitutional rights we view as divine, comes great responsibility. The responsibility of adhering to the practices of the republic, the responsibility of knowing and safeguarding our inalienable rights, and the responsibility of not abusing what we have fought for so hard through war, civil disobedience, sweat and tears. These responsibilities are a task each one of us inherits as an American. We must not lose sight, or abandon any of our greatest responsibilities, especially the responsibility of practicing how each of us deserves to be treated, and the responsibility of modeling for the next generation on how a civilized society treats one another.

We must revert back to the roots of what has grown us into a great and powerful nation. Our ability to listen to each other, our ability to respect, honor, and celebrate differences, and our ability to educate, grow, and lead **our children** into honoring and practicing the same values. There is universal truth in the statement <u>"do unto others"</u>, we must begin practicing this statement in not only

all of our daily affairs, but also in how we interact with others on social media and all aspects of technology.

We are a community! We are achieving progress and greatness!



Winter Safety Tips

- With the clocks changing on November 4 be sure that your smoke detector batteries and carbon monoxide detector batteries are changed as well. Operable smoke and carbon monoxide detectors are your first line of defense with regard to home fires.
- The winter heating season is upon us. Your furnaces will be working hard again this year to keep your home warm so be certain that they are operating efficiently by scheduling an annual cleaning and servicing. For those who heat by wood your chimney should be cleaned annually as well. It is better to burn hot initially to burn off creosote that has accumulated in your chimney or stovepipe. But sometimes the thickness of the creosote is too much to effectively burn off and it causes a chimney fire. In older, unlined chimneys this is dangerous as the fire could spread to the inner walls of your home. It is best to check out your chimney before the beginning of the heating season to be certain it is clean and is not cracked inside which could lead to a house fire.
- Non-vented space or kerosene heaters sometimes are used inside residences to provide limited area heating. These devices can produce carbon monoxide gas which can lead to death of occupants. Do NOT use unvented kerosene or propane space heaters inside your home.

Reminder that Residential curbside collection of Trash and Recycling will run on **its**



normal schedule during the month of November.

Metal/Electronics Curbside Collection by Public Works crews will occur on Tuesday, November 13, 2018. Residents should call by Monday, November 12, 2018 to be placed on the pick-up list. Use

of bulky waste/metal waste stickers is required and can be purchased at City Hall, City Clerk/Treasurer office, (cash or check) and at the DPW building at 18 Lilac Lane (check only).

Brush Pick-up: Public Works Highway crews will collect residential <u>brush</u> the week of November 19th through the 21st. Residents need to call by Friday, November 16th to be placed on the pick-up list.

Bagged Leaves: Department Highway crews will collect <u>bagged leaves</u> the **week of November 26th through November 30th.** Residents should place their bagged leaves curbside on their regular trash pick-up day. Every effort will be made to collect the bagged leaves on the day of your normal trash collection. Bag volumes may require you leave the bags along the front of your property for pick up after these posted collection dates.

Public Works Improvement Projects Continue to Make Lasting Impressions

The Department is working with the Planning and Development Department on engineering and design for new sidewalks on High St. from Washington St. to Franklin St., a new signalized crosswalk at High St. and Memorial Dr., a new sidewalk on Cemetery Rd. and an upgraded pathway between Maplewood Elementary School and Somersworth Middle School. These improvements under design is associated with the City's Transportation Alternative Program (TAP) Grant. Also under design is continued engineering work on three streets in the City using complete street design approach for Main St., Constitution Way and Cemetery Rd. Engineering and design plans are anticipated to be complete on all of these streets and sidewalks in later 2019.

City Road Repair Work Is Underway

The City is continuing with road improvements on several City streets and Roads. Brox industries has completed work on Salmon Falls Road and Otis Road, and work is currently underway on Main Street, Washington Street, and Constitutional Way. Look for updates on the City's website at www.somersworth.com. All streets repaired and resurfaced will have a 3-5 year excavation moratorium depending on the treatment method; meaning utility cuts in the newly resurfaced streets are prohibited.

Water Crews work to Maintain Water Distribution Mains.


The Water Distribution crew maintains the City water mains, valves and hydrants and works to ensure the safe and efficient delivery of drinking water to the residents and businesses in the City. Water crews flush hydrants annually, respond to water main leaks and breaks and inspects backflow preventers on commercial accounts to ensure no contaminates from outside operations, is brought into the City's water mains.




A Message from the Sustainability Committee

It's starting to get cold outside...While there are many steps you can take to winterize your home and save energy and money, here are some that require only a trip to the store, very little money and very little time.

- Replace the draft stopper under your door. You can also get a slide on version for about \$12.
- Weather stripping at the tops and bottoms of your windows wears out.
 You can replace it (or add it, if there currently is none) for between 20 and 50 cents per foot. Most brands come in rolls that you can cut and adhere to the window.
- Insulate the hot water pipes in your basement. There are simple foam sleeves with cut that allows you to just slip them onto the pipe. This costs between 30 cents and \$1 per foot, depending on the diameter of the pipe. Pipes can be ½ inch (a little less than the diameter of a dime), ¾ inch (diameter of a penny) or 1 inch (the diameter of a quarter). Be sure to check the temperature of the pipe beforehand to prevent burning yourself.
- Install outlet and light switch insulation. These foam inserts go behind the face plates of your light switches and outlets, which are otherwise easy ways for heat to escape your house. Some outlets get so cold that you can see ice on the face plate screws. The inserts come in a variety of shapes. They cost about a dollar per insert much less in bulk.
- A bit more expensive, but just as easy is making an appointment for a furnace cleaning. Your oil company will probably clean your furnace for about \$100. Most companies recommend cleaning it annually, to maintain efficiency and increase its lifetime. A dirty filter, for example, can restrict air flow, so that the furnace has to burn longer to bring your room temperature up to your thermostat setting.
