My Pledge to Our Veterans

The beloved day to commemorate and honor the brave souls who have served the United States is approaching. Veterans Day was made a legal holiday back on November 11, 1954; this is the day the efforts of the heroic people who have aided and served our country are recognized. 

SNOW EMERGENCY PARKING

Permits for Noble Street and River Street Parking during Snow Emergency Parking Bans will become Available beginning October 1, 2022.

On January 7, 2019, the Somersworth City Council passed Ordinance 9-19 to allow permit parking during snow emergency parking bans on Noble Street adjacent to the Noble Pines Park, and on River Street adjacent to Jules Bisson Park.

Permits to park there during parking bans resulting from a snow emergency are available from November 1 thru March 31 at a rate of \$20.00 per month, and are available at the Police Department.

There are 17 spaces available on Noble Street and 5 spaces available on River Street. Permits will be issued on a first come, first served basis. The permits are only valid during the dates listed when there is a snow emergency parking ban in effect.

Vehicles parked in this area with a valid permit must be moved by 8 am on the day following the completion of the parking ban to allow for snow removal from the designated area. Vehicles not moved per the Ordinance will be subject to being towed at the owner's expense.

Veteran's Day, Carbon Monoxide Awareness Month, and Thanksgiving A Monthly Update and Safety Message from the Fire Chief's Office Veteran's Day and the Fire Service:

On the 11th hour, of the 11th day, in the 11th month of 1918, the armistice between the allied powers and Germany went into effect ending "the war to end all wars". Over the years, recognition of the armistice ending WW I has evolved into the national holiday that we now know as Veteran's Day.

On Friday, November 11 we pause to remember and thank all veterans for their sacrifices and commitment to the defense of freedom including Somersworth Fire Department personnel Lt Mathew Moore (USN), Lt Michael Spinney (USAF), FF William Staples (USN), and FF Brian Flood (USMC).

The presence of veterans across the Fire Service in the United States has been prevalent since the military demobilization following WW II. This enduring presence has strengthened the Fire Service by reinforcing the fire command system, placing an emphasis on training and procedures, and focusing on mission accomplishment where "failure is not an option". Our most important activity is responding to emergencies and calls for service today while our second most important activity is preparing to respond tomorrow. Consistent with our vision know that your Somersworth Fire Department is always ready, constantly improving, and ever vigilant.

November is Carbon Monoxide Awareness Month: Carbon monoxide (CO) is a colorless and odorless gas that is produced as a byproduct of incomplete combustion of wood and fossil fuels (charcoal, heating oil, propane, natural gas, etc.). CO is also present in the exhaust of diesel and gasoline powered engines. According to the Journal of the American Medical Association, CO poisoning is the number one cause of accidental poisoning in the United States and is responsible for an average of 450 deaths each year.

To guard against CO, have your chimney and furnace/boiler serviced on a regular basis. In addition, if there is an electrical power failure, don't move your grill inside or use other unauthorized or dangerous heating devices to keep warm. Place a portable generator well away from the house – not in the garage, or in a breezeway, or on the deck.

With CO being colorless and odorless, medical signs and symptoms often appear when it is too late and can mimic other conditions including nausea, headaches, dizziness, weakness, chest pain and vomiting. In more severe poisoning cases, people may experience disorientation or unconsciousness, or suffer long-term neurological disabilities, cardiorespiratory failure, or death.

Consequently, a properly placed and maintained CO detector/alarm is an absolute necessity in your home. For details on CO alarm placement and other CO considerations, see the CO Safety sheet that follows.

In the event of a CO alarm activation, move all occupants to fresh air and call 9-1-1. Please do not call the business line to the Somersworth Fire Department as it is not answered if Fire Department personnel are out of the Fire Station on a call. The 9-1-1 call centers are staffed 24/7/365 – your call will always be answered.

We are all well aware of the strain that heating prices are placing on households across the City. However, please do not use grills, space heaters, ovens, the stove, or other dangerous heating sources especially those with an open flame. Carbon monoxide (as described above) and the risk of fire are very real and life threatening.

With the celebration of Thanksgiving near the end of the month, the SFD wants to remind you that Thanksgiving is often the worst day of the year for house fires. With crowed home kitchens, children running around, hot stoves and ovens, pots and pans that may have improperly placed handles, as well as other hazards, the potential is high for someone to get hurt or burned, or for a fire to start. Take a moment to think through your activities so as to keep those celebrating with you safe.

Feel free to call the Fire Station if you have questions about any emergency management, fire prevention, or life safety topic.

Often called the invisible killer, carbon monoxide is an invisible, odorless, colorless gas created when fuels (such as gasoline, wood, coal, natural gas, propane, oil, and methane) burn incompletely. In the home, heating and cooking equipment that burn fuel can be sources of carbon monoxide.

- CO alarms should be installed in a central location outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home and in other locations where required by applicable laws, codes or standards. For the best protection, interconnect all CO alarms throughout the home. When one sounds, they all sound.
- Follow the manufacturer's instructions for placement and mounting height.
- Choose a CO alarm that is listed by a qualified testing laboratory.
- Call your local fire department's non-emergency number to find out what number to call if the CO alarm sounds.
- Test CO alarms at least once a month; replace them according to the manufacturer's instructions.
- If the audible trouble signal sounds, check for low batteries. If the battery is low, replace it. If it still sounds, call the fire department.
- If the CO alarm sounds, immediately move to a fresh air location outdoors or by an open window or door. Make sure everyone inside the home is accounted for. Call for help from a fresh air location and stay there until emergency personnel declare that it is safe to re-enter the home.
- If you need to warm a vehicle, remove it from the garage immediately after starting it. Do not run a vehicle or other fueled engine or motor indoors, even if garage doors are open. Make sure the exhaust pipe of a running vehicle is not covered with snow.
- During and after a snowstorm, make sure vents for the dryer, furnace, stove, and fireplace are clear of snow build-up.
- A generator should be used in a well-ventilated location outdoors away from windows, doors and vent openings.
- Gas or charcoal grills can produce CO only use outside.

Have fuel-burning heating equipment and chimneys inspected by a professional every year before cold weather sets in. When using a fireplace, open the flue for adequate ventilation. Never use your oven to heat your home.

FACTS

- (!) A person can be poisoned by a small amount of CO over a longer period of time or by a large amount of CO over a shorter amount of time.
- (!) In 2010, U.S. fire departments responded to an estimated 80,100 nonfire CO incidents in which carbon monoxide was found, or an average of nine calls per hour.





Thanksgiving is one of the largest get-togethers in the US follow these safety tips to keep your friends and family safe:

• Be sure **electric cords are not dangling** off the counter within easy reach of children or pets.

• Keep the floor clear of kids, toys, pets, bags, etc., so you don't trip while carrying hot food or liquids.

 Stay with your food in the kitchen while you're cooking. Stove fires start when we become distracted! —"When You Cook, Stay and Look!"

. Kids should stay 3 feet away from the stove.

 Use the back burners when cooking, and turn pot/pan handles towards the back where little hands can't reach.





The theme for this year's Fire Prevention month was "fire won't wait – plan your escape" which emphasizes hope escape planning to include having two ways out of every space if possible and gathering at a designated meeting spot once outside. On Monday, 24 October, personnel from the SFD provided fire and life safety education to grades K through 3 at Idlehurst Elementary. Students received a tour of a pumper truck and were presented with a short skit emphasizing safety while playing and exiting the home in the event of a fire at night. Children also received activities that they can share with an adult.



Firefighters take a well-deserved break after extinguishing a third-floor fire at 116 Green Street on 3 October. Full staffing, a quick response, and proper tactics enabled the fire to be quickly "knocked down". The nature of older construction required extensive overhaul to check for extension and ensure the fire was out. The Berwick, Dover, Rochester, Durham, and Newington fire departments aided in fire suppression. The South Berwick FD provided station coverage. The SPD and Stewart's Ambulance assisted at the scene. Department of Public Works & Utilities

Residential Solid Waste and Recycling Collection Services -7am set outs: Residents are asked to set out trash bags and recycling bins during their weekly collections **no later than 7am on the day of collection**. No rubbish will be picked up that is not contained by an approved specially marked bag that is not along the curbside.

Blocked Streets

Trailers, delivery vans and other large equipment that blocks or reduces the travel lane on streets scheduled for recycling or trash collection may create a postponement of service if Waste Management trucks cannot safely access the street. Residents are asked to be aware of delivery and equipment access schedules to your property so as to not contribute to service interruption to you or your neighbors.

November Holiday Schedule

There will be no delay in Trash/Recycling Collection on November for Veteran's Day, Friday, November 11 or Thanksgiving, or Friday, November 24 & 25.

Non- Metal Bulky Waste Disposal: Please get "Bulky Waste" Stickers

All non-metal bulky waste items require "Bulky Waste" Stickers. These stickers cost \$4.00/per 50lbs and can be purchased using cash, check, or credit/debit cards at City Hall or at the Department of Public Works, **checks only**. Non-Metal Bulky items will be collected by Waste Management and must be placed curbside by 7:00am on your normal trash collection day with the appropriate amount of Bulky Waste Stickers visible to the Waste Management driver.

Residents are reminded that items set out for collection without Bulky Waste Stickers will not be collected and are subject to code violations for a property non-compliance.

Metal Pick-up

The Department of Public Works reminds residents that metal pick up occurs on the 2nd Tuesday of the month. The November collection will occur on Tuesday, November 8. Residents wanting this service are asked to call Public Works **no later than 3:00 pm on Monday, November 7** to be placed on the pickup schedule for November. Participants are reminded to place the proper number of tags on the item when setting the item out on the street for collection. Typical TV's require three (3) stickers - \$12.00 and PC's require one (1) sticker - \$4.00. Residents may also opt to drop off metal and electronic items with proper bulky waste stickers at the Public Works Facility located at 18 Lilac Lane from 7:30am-2:30pm Monday –Friday.

Brush and Bagged Leaves Collection:

Public Works Highway crews will start collecting residential brush during the week of November 21st through the 25th. **Residents need to call Public Works at 692-4266 by Friday, November 18th to be placed on the pick-up list.** Please note, brush can be up to five (5) inches in diameter and ten (10) feet long.

Department Highway crews will also be collecting bagged leaves the week of November 28nd through December 2nd. Residents do not need to call to be put on a list for this service. Bagged leaves should be placed curbside on your regular trash pick-up day, no later than 7am. The paper leaf bags can be purchased at grocery store chains, hardware stores, and Home Depot.

Malley Farm

Reminder that the Malley Farm brush and leaf pile will remain open through the Fall and early Winter as long as the weather conditions permit. Typically, Malley Farm will close after the first major snow event in the City. Hours of operation are: Monday - Friday 7:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Saturday & Sunday 8:00 a.m. - 6:00 p.m.



Rocky Hill Road Culvert project completed.

Wickson Construction completed the replacement of the culvert at Rocky Hill Road near Winter Street in mid-October. The project involved the replacement of a failing drainage culvert, and a segment of sewer and water main that are above and below the new culvert. The project also included new guard rail and pavement over the exposed areas. During construction Rocky Hill Road was closed at Winter St and Rocky Hill Road.

Driveway, Obstruction & Trench Opening Permit Reminder-Winter Moratorium takes effect November 15-April 15.

As a reminder, any work done within the City Right-Of-Way requires a permit. Examples include resurfacing or rebuilding your driveway, with a new driveway apron connecting to the streets, street openings for utility connections and if occupying a street or sidewalk with staging or roll- off for debris removal /property repairs. The annual winter moratorium takes effect

from November 15-April 15; prohibiting any excavating or work in the ROW during this period. If you have questions on the work you intend to complete within the Right-Of-Way, please call the Public Works Department at 692-4266. Permit applications can be located at the City website on the **Public Works & Utilities Engineering Page.**

Residents that have not yet signed up to receive City of Somersworth alerts and notices about winter related parking bans, traffic delays due to construction, water main breaks, or City facility closures are encouraged to sign up to receive text or emails by registering at <u>www.somersworthnh.gov</u>. Protect your household water lines

The colder weather can put your water pipes at risk of freezing and bursting which could cause extensive water damage.

Here are a few things you can do to protect your water lines:

- Keep building temperatures as consistent as possible, never less than 55 degrees Fahrenheit.
- Insulate areas where water supply lines are located and eliminate drafts.
- If you have water pipes in basements, crawl spaces, or outside walls,

insulate the pipes, using pipe-sleeves or other insulating material.

• Allow warm air to circulate by opening up doors to closets and cabinets where pipe chases are located.

If you suspect that a pipe is particularly susceptible to freezing, as an emergency measure, leave water running at a trickle to prevent freezing. This is never recommended as a permanent measure and should be monitored frequently.

Never use torches or devices with open flames to thaw frozen pi pe.

October marked National Farm to School month, and Maple Wood Elementary School launched their latest '22-23 initiative, Farm to School Fridays, to celebrate.

4th grade teacher Emily Wilson is adapting

Month calendar(https://www.nhharvestofthemonth.org/) all year to share during lunch times, while students sample the featured monthly produce prepared by our talented and kind Cafe Services staff. The lessons include the sustainability of eating locally, some fun food trivia, and draw connections to curriculum content where relevant.
