State Primary Election is September 13, 2022 The State Primary Election will be held on Tuesday, Sept. 13, 2022, from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

There are two separate ballots in a primary election: One for registered Republicans, and one for registered Democrats.

Voters who are undeclared, and who wish to vote, can declare a party on the day of the primary and will receive that party's ballot. Voters can change party status back to undeclared by signing a form at the polls, following the vote.

Deadline to change party affiliation was May 31, 2022

The last day a registered voter could change their party affiliation before the 2022 State Primary Election was May 31, 2022. Per State law, voters may not change their party affiliation 90 days before a primary.

Supervisors of the Checklist in Session on September 7

The Supervisors of the Checklist will meet on Wednesday, September 7, 2002, from 5:00 p.m. to 5:30 p.m., at the City Clerk's office at City Hall, One Government Way.

During this session, supervisors will register new voters, make changes to addresses and names, and other necessary corrections to the checklist.

Voters cannot change party affiliation during this session.

City of Somersworth Special Municipal Election – Ward Boundary Adjustments September 13, 2022

The City of Somersworth is having a Special Municipal Election simultaneously with the State Primary Election on September 13th. The Special Election is regarding a City Charter Amendment proposing Ward Boundary changes and will be voted on a separate ballot. Changes to Ward Boundaries are reviewed every 10 years in conjunction with the Federal Census in order to seek population equalization within the 5 Wards of the City of Somersworth.





Effective Immediately

The City of Somersworth's on-line services has changed from **somersworth.com to somersworthnh.gov.**

Many State and local governments have transitioned to .GOV domains as this

A safety message from the Fire Chief's Office

September is National Preparedness Month (NPM) and this year's theme is – "A Lasting Legacy: The life you've built is worth protecting". With the heart of hurricane season upon us, September is a great month to promote personal disaster planning. Note the following considerations:

- **STOCKPILE BOTTLES OF WATER**. During a flood, hurricane, or other emergency, normal water sources may not be available. A few cases of bottled water on hand can make a huge difference in an emergency.
- STORE READY-TO-EAT CANNED FOOD. In the event of a major emergency with associated power outages it's important to have food on hand that can be eaten without requiring a heat source. Canned food works as it has a long shelf life, making it easier and less expensive to store. Store your stockpiled canned goods separate from your household food, and try not to borrow from your stockpile; the goal is to make sure you're prepared in the event of an emergency. Check your stockpile periodically for expiration dates.
- **KEEP A MANUAL CAN OPENER** with the stored canned food.
- KEEP PESCRIBED MEDICATIONS AND OVER THE COUNTER MEDICATIONS AVAILABLE. Keep extra medication and a list of the medications each family member takes, why they take them and their dosages.
- STORE PERSONAL CARE ITEMS AND TOILETRIES IN YOUR "GO BAG".
- HAVE A GOOD LED FLASHLIGHT AND EXTRA BATTERIES.
- HAVE A BATTERY-OPERATED RADIO AND FOLLOW LOCAL MEDIA FOR THE MOST UP-TO-DATE INFORMATION. The national weather service, as well as state and local officials use TV, radio, and a variety of social media outlets to disseminate urgent warnings and emergency information. Many news outlets use a variety of smart device applications. Extra chargers and batteries for mobile phones and devices are a must. Make sure you stay connected.
- **STORE EXTRA CLOTHES IN YOUR "GO BAG".** Lightweight rain gear and a mylar blanket are good additions.
- INCLUDE A BASIC FIRST AID KIT.
- ORGANIZE AND PROTECT IMPORTANT DOCUMENTS. Include important phone numbers and emergency contact information, credit cards, birth certificates, deeds, photo IDs, proof of address, etc. In addition, consider cash in small bills kept in a waterproof container, extra set of car and house keys, notepad and pen,

contact and meeting place information for your household, and a small regional map. Store important documents such as social security cards, birth certificates and licenses in air-tight and waterproof containers to minimize damage. Include sentimental items that can't be replaced, such as photographs. Insurance documents should be included along with a list of serial numbers for your valuable belongings. Organize and store these documents so you can "grab and go" in an emergency.

Finally, always be prepared to leave. In the event of an emergency, you may only have a short amount of time to evacuate. Being prepared will contribute to your survival should disaster strike.

Residential Solid Waste & Recycling Collection Reminders Services - 7am set outs:

Residents are asked to set out trash bags and

recycling bins during their weekly collections no later than 7am on the day of collection. The City's Solid Waste Ordinance states: Residents will place their rubbish to be collected along the curbside or street-side where normally the curbing would be, in specially marked bags City Blue Bags on the evening before, or by 7:00 a.m. on their scheduled pickup day. No rubbish will be picked up that is not contained by an approved specially marked City Blue Bag that is not along the curbside, nor more frequently than once a week for any person, firm or corporation.

Metal Pick-up

The 2nd Tuesday of the month. The September collection will occur on **Tuesday, September 13. Residents must call Public Works no later than 3:00 pm on Monday, September 12**, to be placed on the pickup schedule for September. Typical TVs require three (3) stickers - \$12.00 and PC's require one (1) sticker - \$4.00. Residents may also opt to drop off metal and electronic items with proper bulky waste stickers at the Public Works Facility located at 18 Lilac Lane from 7:30 am-2:30 pm Monday –Friday. Please ensure the proper # stickers are on each item.

Reminder Notice of Labor Day Holiday Trash and Recycling Schedule – One Day Delay

Labor Day is on Monday, September 5. Trash and Recycling collection services will be delayed one day, with Monday collection occurring on Tuesday, Tuesday collection on Wednesday and Wednesday collection on Thursday.

Noble Pines Park Basketball Court gets a Face Lift.

The City contracted with Vermont Recreational Surfacing & Fencing, Inc. to complete the resurfacing of the Noble Pines Basketball Court. Work is approximately 75% complete. The contractor will be returning later this September to install the paint for the court layout lanes and boundaries and to provide shoulder material around the sides of the court. The new surface was part of the City's FY22 Budget. Staff will be soliciting bids this fall for a new surface on the Jules Bisson Park Basketball Court as well.

Driveway, Obstruction & Trench Opening Permit Reminder

As a reminder, **any work done within the Right-Of-Way requires a permit and a Digsafe**. Trench Opening and Obstruction permits will also require a Certificate of Insurance and Bond. Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) Fall Reminder – Pet Waste Dog waste negatively impacts our water quality; please remember to pick up your pet waste. This message is being conveyed as part of the City's outreach and education requirements for our stormwater discharge permit issued by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

Rocky Hill Road Culvert Replacement Under Way

City Council awarded a contract to Wickson Construction to replace a culvert located on Rocky Hill Road, close to the intersection with Winter Street and Maple Street. The project involves replacing an old failing corrugated metal culvert and a segment of water and sewer lines in the vicinity of the culvert. The project will involve a temporary road closure from the first week in July through the beginning of October in this area. Rocky Hill Road will be closed at Winter Street; during the temporary road closure period.

The project began on July 5th. The water main has been replaced and the culvert is being installed. Remaining work includes sewer main replacement, headwall installation, final paving and guardrails. Work in expected to be completed October 2022.
