State Primary Election September 8, 2020 Polls are Open from 7:00 am - 7:00 pm

For the 2020 State Primary Elections, voters are allowed to appear at their Ward's polling place and



deliver their own completed absentee ballots in the same manner they would deliver an absentee ballot to the City Clerk prior to Election day.

Absentee Ballots must be received at the City Clerk's office no later than September 7, 2020 via mail no later than 5:00 pm.

Absentee Ballots must be received no later than 5:00 PM on Election Day. After 5:00 PM on Election Day, absentee ballots cannot be accepted but the voter can still vote in person at their Ward polling place.

How Cloth Face Coverings help Slow the Spread of COVID-19

COVID-19 spreads mainly from person to person through respiratory droplets produced when an infected person coughs, sneezes, talks, or raises their voice (e.g., while shouting, chanting, or singing). These droplets can land in the mouths or noses of people who are nearby or possibly be inhaled into the lungs. **Recent studies** show that a significant portion of individuals with COVID-19 lack symptoms (are "asymptomatic") and that even those who eventually develop symptoms (are "presymptomatic") can transmit the virus to others before showing symptoms.

To reduce the spread of COVID-19, CDC recommends that people wear cloth face

coverings in public settings when around people outside of their household, especially when other **social distancing** measures are difficult to maintain.

The City Council recently unanimously adopted a resolution requesting the use of face coverings /masks in public to help prevent the spread of the COVID-19 coronavirus.

Solid Waste and Recycling - Holiday Delays

Due to the Labor Day holiday on Monday, September 7, there will be a one (1) day delay in the collection of trash and recycling, as follows:

Metal/Electronics Curbside Collection

Upcoming Brush & Bagged Leaves Pick-up

Brush Pick-up

Public Works Highway crews will start collecting residential brush during the week of October 19th through 23rd. Residents need to call by Friday, October 16th to be placed on the pick-up list.

Bagged Leaves

Department Highway crews will also be collecting bagged leaves the week of October 26th through 30th. Residents should place their bagged leaves curbside on their regular trash pick-up day. The paper leaf bags can be purchased at grocery store chains, hardware stores, Home Depot.

City staff is continuing to monitor water levels in the Salmon Falls River where the City draws its drinking water and report water levels continue to be at standard levels. However Temperatures have been above average since May and are predicted to continue to be above average through October.

Disasters Don't Wait - Make Your Plan Today! A Safety Message from the Fire Chief's Office

Since 2004, September has been recognized as National Preparedness Month. With the heart of hurricane season upon us, September is a great month to promote family and community disaster planning. This year's theme is: "Disasters Don't Wait. Make Your Plan Today." With the COVID-19 pandemic and all that mother nature throws at us, there is no better time to be involved in planning than during the month of September. This year's theme is broken into weekly activities.

Week 1 - Make A Plan: Talk to your friends and family about how you will communicate before, during, and after a disaster. Make sure everyone in your household knows and understands your hurricane plan. Don't forget a plan for the office, kids' daycare, and anywhere you frequent. Take into consideration recommendations from the State of NH and the Centers for Disease Control regarding COVID-19 pandemic precautions.

Week 2 - Build A Kit: Gather supplies that will last for several days after a disaster for everyone living in your home. Don't forget to consider the unique needs each person or pet may have in case you have to evacuate quickly. Don't forget spare face coverings/masks, hand sanitizer, cleaning supplies, medications, back-up charging devices for your electronics, and pet supplies when you pack your go bag or load your vehicle. Keep your cell phone charged when you know a hurricane is in the forecast.

Week 3 -Prepare for Disasters: Know the risk of disasters in our area and obtain the proper insurance coverage. Act fast if you receive a local warning or alert. A hurricane watch means hurricane conditions are possible in a stated area. Experts announce hurricane watches 48 hours before they expect tropical-storm-force winds to start. A hurricane warning is more serious. It means hurricane-force winds are expected in a stated area. Experts issue these warnings 36 hours before tropical-storm-force winds are expected in the area to give people enough time to prepare for the storm. **Download the FEMA app** and receive real-time alerts from the National Weather Service for up to five locations nationwide. Be aware of the Emergency Alert System (EAS) and Wireless Emergency Alert (WEA)- which requires no-sign up. Learn how to make your home stronger and get your home ready in the face of storms and other common hazards. Declutter drains and gutters, bring in outside furniture, consider hurricane shutters. Be ready to turn off your power. If you see flooding, downed power lines, or you have to leave your home, switch your power off. Fill clean water containers with drinking water. You'll want to do this in case you lose your water supply during the storm. You can also fill up your sinks and bathtubs with water for washing. Get your vehicle ready. Fill your vehicle's gas tank, and move your vehicle into your garage or under cover if not evacuating.

Week 4 - Teach and prepare the vulnerable: Talk to children about preparing for emergencies and what to do in case you are separated. Reassure them by providing information about what they can do to be safe in the event of an emergency. Inform the elderly about what they can do to stay informed and protect themselves in the event of an emergency. If you or anyone in your household is an individual with a disability make a plan and arrange for help from family, friends, or neighbors. Pre-identify shelters, a pet-friendly hotel, or an out-of-town friend or relative where you can take your pets in an evacuation.

Somersworth School Meal Program

As part of School's reopening plan, the Somersworth School District has opted to start the school year in remote learning. The School District feels that it is vitally important for students to have access to good, nutritious meals even when they are not physically in the school building. As such, we are making meals at home available for all students.

Meals will be available for pick up daily before the school day begins for those students who have signed up for this program. Your assigned location for pick up will identified after you sign up for the program. The meals will be provided in a large bag, with the food properly packaged and labelled. Food will need to be stored properly upon arrival at your home.

The regular cost for breakfast is \$1.65 for elementary students and \$1.95 for middle/high school students; lunch is \$2.75 for elementary students and \$2.90 for middle/high school students. Meals will be charged to your student's food service account. Funds can be added to the account by using the online payment portal or by cash or check when meals are picked up.

The reduced cost for breakfast is .30 and .40 for lunch. Meals will be charged to student's food service account. Funds can be added to the account by using the online payment portal or by cash or check when meals are picked up.
