The Mayor's Corner

Somersworth is NH's Welcoming City

In 1729, the Parish of Somersworth was founded, beginning the two hundred and ninety year old journey which continues to establish Somersworth as a modern day City. Throughout our history, we have been defined by the citizens who have built this community and the vastly diverse backgrounds they have brought with them. From the early English settlers to members of the Indonesians community, each group sought refuge in a community where they would be protected, accepted and celebrated.

Today, two hundred and ninety years after our founding, we are guided by the principals outlined in the Declaration of Independence and re-affirmed in the United States Constitution; that all citizens are created equal, that each of us have been endowed by the creator with certain unalienable rights, and that despite our comfort level and misunderstandings of each other, we will continue to build upon the progression of the generation of Americans who came before us, to create a society where all will be validated and protected.

The struggle of America to achieve its creed, is a struggle which is worth fighting for. It is our struggle, mirrored in our history which reminds us of the Americans who were denied the rights and liberties we have been promised. Two hundred and ninety years after its founding as a parish and one hundred and twenty six years after its establishment as a City, Somersworth has once more awakened to the roots of its "Proud Past, Bright Future" through the acknowledgement that we are all linked together by a common thread; the thread of our humanity. While this thread will differ in the languages we speak, the customs we practice and the faith we hold or chose not to, in the Hilltop City, we are all united by the common bond of our sister and brother hood. While each of us is different, we are all Hilltoppers, Americans and Humans. It is through this understanding of our differences that Somersworth has emerged as NH's Welcoming City. A City which has, and will continue to open it's arms for all, and protect all who are dedicated to the values of equality and human dignity.

In the Hilltop City, NH's Welcoming City we rise above the level of just tolerating each other. Here we strive to create a community



Somersworth Police Department Provides Crime Reduction Training

On January 24, members of the Somersworth Police Department Patrol Division conducted their first, in the series crime reduction training, to the staff of Profile Bank. Today's topic was focused on what to do during a bank robbery. The course was designed to show different points of views on reactions and response from the tellers and law enforcement. There was a heavy emphasis placed on safety as well as what types of information SPD would be looking for going forward on an investigation.

Laraine Hults the Business Development Manager, for the Somersworth Profile Bank was instrumental in helping set up this course. She and the staff appreciated the efforts that the SPD put forth and the community connections that were made today. Additional trainings will be scheduled with the other financial institutions of the city and going forward the SPD will be reaching out to conduct crime prevention surveys and will assist with the creation of preemptive drills to other local branches in the city.

Permit Parking for Snow Emergencies Noble Street and River Street

The Somersworth City Council passed an Ordinance to allow Permit Parking during snow emergency parking bans on Noble Street adjacent to the Noble Pines Park, and on River Street adjacent to Jules Bisson Park.

Permits to park there during parking bans resulting from a snow emergency are available from November 1st thru March 31st at a rate of \$20.00 per month, and are available at the Police Department.

There are 17 spaces available on Noble Street and 5 spaces available on River Street. Permits will be issued on a first come, first served basis. The permits are only valid during the dates listed when there is a snow emergency parking ban in effect.

Vehicles parked in this area with a valid permit must be moved by 8 a.m. on the day following the completion of the parking ban to allow for snow removal from the designated area. Vehicles not moved per the Ordinance will be subject to being towed at the owner's expense.

2019 Alarm Permit

Alarm permit renewals are due to the Police Department by the end of January or the \$10.00 fee increases to \$20.00. If you own a fire alarm or security system alarm, our City Ordinance requires you to obtain a permit. If the alarm is for a residence and you are 65 or older, your permit is free. Snow Emergencies Winter Parking Ban

Snow Emergencies can be called at any time, day or night. During Snow Emergencies, a Parking Ban is in effect. Always be aware of overnight weather forecasts and have alternative parking plans when snow is predicted. Your vehicle can be towed during a Snow Emergency and you will have to pay the tow charge to get it back. The purpose of the parking ban is to enable Public Works to safely maintain the roads. This means sometimes there will be a Snow Emergency declared even when it is no longer snowing. Snow emergencies are announced on the following stations: WTSN, WOKQ, WERZ, WSHK, WHEB, WMUR Channel 9 and Local Cable Station

Channel 22. You may also call the **Winter Ban Hot Line at 692-9131** or go to www.Somersworth.com. To receive news of parking bans via email, go to www.Somersworth.com and click "Subscribe-City Email.

Be prepared for Winter Storms

The New Hampshire Homeland Security and Emergency Management Agency has a lot of good information at www.readynh.gov so pay it a visit!

- If you have a power venter on your oil or gas furnace, be sure to keep your exterior vent free from snow. Often drifting snow
 can temporarily block the vent, and if does not clear itself from snow upon firing, dangerous levels of carbon monoxide can build
 up in your home.
- The winter months often cause wood burning stoves and furnaces to build creosote layers in chimneys and manufactured stovepipes. Burn your initial fires hot each day to clean out any lingering effects of creosote build-up and avoid soft woods, if possible.
- Winter storms sometimes cause power failures. If you have a portable generator, be sure to follow directions on the
 methodology to connect it to your home's power source. If you connect it incorrectly, the generator may power the electrical
 lines outside your home endangering anyone who could contact them, including power company linesmen.
- Citizens living adjacent to fire hydrants are requested to "adopt a hydrant" for the winter and keep it clear after snowstorms. City
 personnel often are tied up with other storm duties and often are not able to get to fire hydrant clearing immediately. Please
 consider this volunteer program.



Frozen Pipes

With the recent stretch of very cold weather we have had several reports of frozen pipes bursting and causing extensive water damage. Your facility maintenance personnel should already have a plan for preventing frozen pipes and responding to emergencies.

Here are a few reminders:

- Keep building temperatures as consistent as possible, never less than 55 degrees Fahrenheit.
- Insulate areas where water supply lines are located and eliminate drafts.
- If you have water pipes in basements, crawl spaces, or outside walls, insulate the pipes, using *pipe-sleeves* or other insulating material.
- Allow warm air to circulate by opening up doors to closets and cabinets where pipe chases are located.
- On at least a daily basis, all areas of the building should be monitored for open windows, heating failures and water leaks. This especially includes nights, weekends, and school breaks.
- · Provide training in emergency response, i.e. shutting off the water supply.

If you suspect that a pipe is particularly susceptible to freezing, as an emergency measure, leave water running at a trickle to prevent freezing. This is never recommended as a permanent measure and should be monitored frequently.

Dry sprinkler systems are still susceptible to freezing, as water can accumulate in low spots and through condensation. All sprinkler systems should be regularly maintained. Contact your sprinkler maintenance company for recommendations.

Have a plan in place for responding to water leaks and heating failures. Your facility maintenance department should have a plan for safely thawing any pipe you believe to be frozen; however, if you are unsure, call a professional. **Never** use torches or devices with open flames to thaw frozen pipes.



"Shell Seekers" by Rosamunde Pilcher



Ready Set Grow!

Year Round Gardening at Somersworth Middle School

While most of us wait (im)patiently for the snow to melt and our gardens to sprout, 7th graders at Somersworth Middle School operate on an entirely different schedule. SMS science teacher Chris Asbell introduces hydroponic growing systems in his classroom, for a truly year round gardening experience. Students learn by doing, and see valuable classroom lessons in action.

Sweets in the Making at Somersworth Middle School

Though the School Gardens are put to bed for the winter, some quiet work is happening at Somersworth Middle School. Last year Daryl Dunbar and his

students tapped over 20 trees on the Middle School and abutting property and was awarded a NH Ag in the Classroom grant toward building an evaporator.

The results were, as expected, delicious, and more maple syrup is on it's way this spring.


