

Residential Solid Waste & Recycling Collection Services - 7am set outs:

Residents are asked to set out trash bags and recycling bins during their weekly collections **no** later than 7am on the day of collection. The City's contractor Waste Management (WM) follows the Solid Waste Ordinance which states:

Residents will place their rubbish to be collected along the curbside or street-side where normally the curbing would be, in specially marked bags as defined in Section 7.1 of the Code, on the evening before, or by 7:00 a.m. on their scheduled pickup day. No rubbish will be picked up that is not contained by an approved specially marked bag that is not along the curbside, nor more frequently than once a week for any person, firm or corporation.

Residents are asked to not assume that WM trucks arrive later in the morning and may set out materials after 7am based on past experiences. WM trucks are assigned daily routes and are subject to starting specific routes at different times due to equipment, traffic and other operational needs. Only constant is they all begin collection on City streets at 7am. Asking WM to return to missed stops due to late set outs can contribute to cost increases to the City.

PLEASE NOTE: There will be no changes in the collection schedule for the July 4th Holiday.

Metal Pick-up

The Department of Public Works reminds residents that metal pick up occurs on the 2nd Tuesday of the month. The July collection will occur on Tuesday, July 13 and residents wanting this service are asked to call Public Works **no later than 3:00 pm on Monday, July 12** to be placed on the pickup schedule for July. Participants are reminded to place the proper number of tags on the item when setting the item out on the street for collection. Typical TV's require three (3) stickers - \$12.00 and PC's require one (1) sticker - \$4.00. Residents may also opt to drop off metal and electronic items with proper bulky waste stickers at the Public Works Facility located at 18 Lilac Lane from 7:30 am-2:30 pm Monday –Friday. Note that winter weather emergencies may delay collection.

City Waste Bags Price Increase effective July 1, 2021

The City Council approved an increase in the price of trash bags to offset program expenses including an increased cost of bag production and recycling expenditures. The increase takes effect as of July 1, 2021. The following lists the new trash bag prices retailers will charge for City Trash bags: 30-Gallon \$2.15/each 15-Gallon \$1.60/each

Adopt-A-Spot

Somersworth residents are encouraged to participate in the City's Adopt a Spot program. Subject to review by the Public Works staff, any public space may be a candidate for volunteers to "Adopt" and help the City reduce litter along City streets, improve and maintain landscaping at a corner traffic island, a garden in Forest Glade Cemetery, or a raised

flower bed in the Downtown District. Volunteers interested in applying for a "spot" may complete an application and submit to the Public Works Department. Further materials including the application can be located on the City's website at www.somersworth.com

Road Resurfacing

The City has contracted Continental Paving to complete pavement resurfacing on several streets beginning on June 1st – July 30th. The City is imposing a daytime (6am to 8pm, Monday – Friday) parking ban on those streets during this time frame. The parking ban remains in effect until the paving is complete on that street (see below for a list of streets scheduled to be resurfaced).

A Safety Message from the Fire Chief's Office

Learn the Sounds of Fire Safety

A new report compiled by the Fire Protection Research Foundation highlights the fact that residential fires continue to be the largest category of structure fire and lead to the majority of the civilian fire injuries and deaths. Although residential fires have seen a decrease in the past decades, statistically, occupants in a house fire are more likely to die today than 40 years ago. Many fatal home fires and home fire deaths can be traced back to a lack of investment in safety such as not maintaining smoke alarms or using inexpensive, unskilled labor to work on electrical and/or heating systems. Extra precautions and greater vigilance in these areas are necessary.

The National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) announced "Learn the Sounds of Fire Safety" as the theme of 2021's Fire Prevention Week (October 3 through October 9). The theme seeks to better educate the public about the sounds of smoke alarms, what they mean, and how to respond to them. Working smoke alarms reduce the risk of dying in a fire by more than half. 41% of household fire deaths occur in homes with no smoke alarm and 16% in homes with alarms that failed to activate.

The key points of "Learn the Sounds of Fire Safety" include:

- Respond immediately to smoke or carbon monoxide (CO) alarm sounds by exiting the home.
- If your alarm begins to chirp, it may mean the batteries need to be replaced or the alarm needs replacing altogether.
- Test all smoke and CO alarms on a monthly basis.

- Install a bed shaker and strobe light alarms if someone in your household is deaf or hard of hearing.
- Know the difference between the sound of a smoke alarm and a CO alarm three beeps for smoke, four beeps for CO.

FIREWORKS SAFETY

With Independence Day and the majority of summer in front of us, learn from the experience of a dad in another state who attempted to light three sparklers at one time on Memorial Day weekend and severely burned his hand. The dad freely admits that he should have followed the instructions on the packaging and been more careful. Unfortunately, this is an all-too-common story. Thousands of emergency room visits a year throughout the country occur due to fireworks injuries. More than 30 percent of those injuries are blamed on sparklers. Sparklers are exciting for children but burn at 1,200 degrees. Children should always be supervised around fireworks. When using sparklers remain at least six feet away from one another and have a water bucket close by to dispose of the spent sparkler. Do not simply drop spent sparklers on the ground especially if children are running around with bare feet. Improper use of fireworks can change a life in an instant - even a sparkler.

Did you License your Dog with the City?

Just a reminder to dog owners in Somersworth: the City does require you to register your dog every year. We are currently preparing our annual forfeiture notices where additional fees and fines are levied and you could be summonsed to court.

If you haven't licensed your dog yet, it is easy and licenses can even be renewed online if you have the dog's tag number at www.Somersworth.com and click on the Online Services and then Dog Licensing. If you are unable to complete it on line, City Hall staff will help you. Just bring your current rabies certificate. City Hall is open Monday through Friday, 8:00 am to 4:30 pm.

Summer Pet Safety

We receive calls every day from caring citizens about animals left in vehicles on warm days. It takes only minutes for a pet left in a vehicle on a warm day to succumb to heatstroke and suffocation.

Even when the outside air temperature is in the 60s, temperatures inside some vehicles can reach the danger zone on bright, sunny days. Many experts recommend not leaving pets or children in parked cars even for short periods if the temperature is in the 60's or higher.

Rolling down a window or parking in the shade doesn't guarantee protection either, since temperatures can still climb into the danger zone. And if the window is rolled down sufficiently, the pet can escape.

Animals are not able to sweat like humans do. Dogs cool themselves by panting and by sweating through their paws. If they have only overheated air to breathe, animals can collapse, suffer brain damage and possibly die of heatstroke. Just 15 minutes can be enough for an animal's body temperature to climb from a normal 102.5 to deadly levels that will damage the nervous and cardiovascular systems, often leaving the animal comatose, dehydrated and at risk of permanent impairment or death.

Precautions: Please leave your dog at home on warm days.

Sustainability Through Community Gardening

Summer is much revered in New England, after many months of leafless trees, frigid temperatures, snow, ice, and cold drizzle. To home gardeners, or even simply garden- appreciators, this season is equivalent to a high-holiday. The ability to grow one's own produce, and the beautiful plants that bring essential pollinating bees and wasps, is a sustainability practice that is both enjoyable and environmentally responsible.

Residents in our City who lack the space at home to garden, or the most optimal sunlight, need not be left out of the gardening loop. The Malley Farm **Community Garden** is open to any Somersworth resident who wishes to grow their own produce and flowering plants, in a communal setting, with lots of sunlight and space. Individual plots are assigned in April, though there may still be a plot or two available for this season.

Another option is Somersworth's Adopt-A-Spot Program. With this program, residents or organizations adopt an existing Adopt-A-Spot locale, or nominate a new public plot of land of their choosing, and care for it throughout the growing season. Maybe there's a blighted corner in a resident's neighborhood that would really dazzle if given some attention during the growing season. Or space in front of a public building that looks a little forgotten.

Family Hike Night Started in June Mondays, through August 23 6:30-7:30 p.m.


We will meet at the Community Campus Playground every Monday night this summer weather-permitting (except July 5th) to walk, talk, explore and play together.
