House and Garden Products:

Weed killers and fertilizers, no pest strips, ant spray and baits, bug and rodent sprays, poisons, flea repellents and shampoos, bug sprays houseplant insecticides, oven cleaners, bleach, pool chemicals, tub, tile and shower cleaners, button cell and <u>lithium batteries</u>.

Garage Products:

Car wash and polish, fuel additives, carburetor / fuel injector cleaners, air conditioning, refrigerants, starter fluids, creosote, antifreeze, transmission and brake fluid.

Workshop / Painting Products:

Oil or enamel based paint, stains and finishes, paint strippers and removers, photographic chemicals, fixatives, adhesives, glues and other solvents.

Not Hazardous Please Do Not bring:

Latex Paint:

Use the paint or open can and let paint dry out. If necessary mix with saw dust, kitty litter or sand and dispose with regular trash.

Tires, Computers, Computer Monitors, and Televisions:

For the collection center nearest you, eall your municipality.

Motor Oil:

The Rochester Public Works Department will be open HHW Day May 1, 2021 to take used motor oil. The Rochester DPW at 45 Old Dover Road is open 7 AM to 3 PM Monday-Friday year round and will take used motor oil that is not contaminated with other solvents.

Batteries & Fluorescent Bulbs:

Zinc carbon and alkaline batteries (regular household) that were sold after 1996 are not hazardous and can be place in the regular trash.

Car Batteries:

Most places that sell car batteries will take them back. Some communities may have battery collections, check with your municipality.

Propane Tanks:

Most places that fill or sell these tanks will also take used tanks. Rochester residents may drop them off at the Rochester DPW at 45 Old Dover Rd.









Vaccine Registration Now Open to All

COVID-19 vaccine registration is open to everyone in New Hampshire ages 16 and older. Parental consent is required for anyone 16 and 17 years of age. To register and schedule your vaccine appointment, go to <u>vaccines.nh.gov</u> and create an account in NH's Vaccine and Immunization Network Interface (VINI). Once registered you will receive an email to activate your account and

schedule your appointment. You can also call 2-1-1 for help with registering and

scheduling. When registering, please be prepared to answer questions about allergies and medications. Information about health insurance is requested, but this information is not required. You will not be charged if you are vaccinated at a state-run site.

City recognizes Arbor Day with a special Tree Planting Event.

City personnel will recognize Arbor Day by planting a new shade tree at Millennium Park. The tree will be donated to the City by the State of New Hampshire Department of Natural Resources, Community Forestry Program and will be planted near the horseshoe pits and volleyball area. The City of Somersworth is a Tree City USA community and has maintained that designation since 1999.

Community Gardens at Malley Farm

The Community Gardens at Malley Farm is getting ready for spring planting. There are 30 garden plots at the Malley Farm and all spaces have been reserved by Somersworth residences. Residence who participate, sign gardening agreements, and are allowed to grow vegetables for their use. The program is supported by the Department of Public Works and volunteer garden stewards provide oversight and are lead points of contact for the gardeners. This year's garden stewards are Judy Goodrow, Lynette Hamblen and Frank Palella. A waiting list for the 2022 season is being developed now. Cemetery Road Reconstruction

The City Council awarded the contract for the reconstruction of Cemetery Road to SUR Construction at their April 5, 2021 City Council meeting. The project involves:

- Complete reconstruction of Cemetery Road's travel lanes and shoulders from Maple St to W. High St.
- Replacement of underground water, storm, and sewer mains.
- Replacement of the existing sidewalks, as well as adding a new sidewalk along the southern edge of the road between the High School and Maple Street.

This Project is planned to start May/June and last two construction seasons.

Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) Spring Reminder –Assist with Water Quality Protection.

As part of the City's obligations under the Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) Permit, we remind residents to address disposing of leaf and yard waste properly, consider composting and avoid material blocking street catch basins. Residents with septic systems are

asked to make sure those systems are in good working order.

Driveway, Obstruction & Trench Opening Permit Reminder

As a reminder, any work done within the Right-Of-Way requires a permit. If you have questions on the work you intend to complete within the Right-Of-Way, please call the Public Works Department at 692-4266. Permit applications can be located at the City website on the Public Works & Utilities Engineering page.

Metal Pick-up

The Department of Public Works reminds residents that metal pick up occurs on the 2nd Tuesday of the month. The May collection will occur on Tuesday, May 11 and residents wanting this service are asked to call Public Works not later than 3:00 pm on Monday, May 10 to be placed on the pickup schedule for April. Participants are reminded to place the proper number of tags on the item when setting the item out on the street for collection. Typical TV's require three (3) stickers - \$12.00 and PC's require one (1) sticker - \$4.00. Residents may also opt to drop off metal and electronic items with proper bulky waste stickers at the Public Works Facility located at 18 Lilac Lane from 7:30 am-2:30 pm Monday –Friday. Note that winter weather emergencies may delay collection.

Bagged Leaves and Brush Pick-up

Brush will be picked up the third week of May, (May 17-21) You must call 692-4266 by Friday, May 14 to be added to the pickup list. Please have your brush curbside no later than 7:00 am on Monday, May 17 for pickup. Brush can be up to five (5) inches in diameter and ten (10) feet long.

PLEASE NOTE: Brush pickup is limited to 20 minutes per stop. Any remaining brush and cleanup of debris is the responsibility of the property owner. City Highway personnel is not allowed to remove brush from private property so please make sure the piles are adjacent to a sidewalk or close to the street edge along the front of your property.

Bagged leaves will be picked up the fourth week in May. (May 24-28) You do not have to call ahead for bagged leaves pickup. Please have leaves curbside no later than 7:00am on your trash pickup day the week of May 24. Leaves and grass clippings must be in brown recyclable paper leaf bags, sold at many local stores.

Malley Farm Facility

Malley Farm is now open for disposal of brush and leaves. Please note: Any Contractor serving a Somersworth residence with leafs and brush hauling, will need to obtain a permit from Public Works to dump at Malley Farm. Wood larger than 5" in diameter and 10' in length is not permitted. Please call the Public Works Department at 603-692-4266 for further information.



PROTECT YOUR FAMILY

If your septic system gets clogged with too much solid waste, it can force the wastewater to back up into your house... it can also overwhelm your leach field, which will turn your yard into a soggy mess. The bacteria in wastewater are not just smelly – they are also a health hazard!

PROTECT YOUR COMMUNITY

If a septic system fails, untreated wastewater can run off into local lakes, ponds or streams, negatively impacting water quality, wildlife and community enjoyment of the water body.

PROTECT YOUR WALLET

Getting your tank pumped costs about \$250-\$500 every 3-5 years. If you have a failure, it could cost you \$6,000-\$15,000 to replace or repair your system.

WHY SHOULD I PUMP?

Every home generates wastewater – via toilets, showers, sink drains, and dish and clothes washers – which must be treated and disposed of properly to protect human health and the environment.

WHEN SHOULD I PUMP?

Don't wait for a failure! Septic tanks should be inspected or pumped every 3–5 years. Get Pumped today!

Only contact a NHDES-licensed septage hauler.

WHY DOES IT MATTER?

You Choose - your leaves and grass clippings can be a valuable resource OR a source of water pollution.

AS A RESOURCE

Mulched leaves or grass clippings on your lawn add valuable nutrients and organic matter.

Composting leaves and grass clippings saves money.

AS A SOURCE OF POLLUTION

Decaying leaves and grass kill critters in streams, rivers, lakes, ponds, and wetlands.

Yard waste dumped near waterbodies and wetlands contributes to stream algae and odors.

Yard waste and grass clippings can be disposed of at the Malley Farm Facility, at Malley Farm Road

Green Grass & Clear Water



Did you know that you can have a healthy, green lawn that is both attractive and safer for the environment?

Some lawn care practices create local water quality problems. Excess nutrients (including nitrogen and phosphorus found in fertilizers) that run off our properties into nearby waterbodies can trigger harmful algal blooms.

Many of us enjoy the time we spend working on our lawns and are willing to try new practices as long as our lawns continue to look good. This information card shares simple and easy tips, customized for northern New England, that can lead to **Green Grass & Clear Water**.

Choose the right grass seed. The best seed mixes include low maintenance varieties with higher % of fine-leaf fescues and turf- or compact-type tall fescues, and lower % of Kentucky bluegrass and perennial rye grass.



Mow smart. Leave grass at least 3" high. Cut no more than one-third (1/3) of the blade each time you mow to encourage longer, stronger roots. Leave the grass clippings after mowing so they can return nutrients to the soil.



Don't overwater. 1" of water per week (from rain or irrigation) is usually enough. Overwatering can cause nutrients to move out of root zones and into waterbodies or groundwater.

Have your soil tested to learn more about specific characteristics and needs of your lawn. Contact UNH Cooperative Extension: extension.unh.edu/programs/soil-testing-services

Only if your lawn requires added nutrients from fertilizer:



5 Avoid overapplying. Measure the area where you plan to apply and calculate the square footage. For lawns 10+ years old, apply half (½) the amount recommended for your square area one time per season. New lawns may need another application. Apply no more than 4 times per season.



Choose the right fertilizer. Select fertilizers with zero or low phosphrous unless a soil test says otherwise. Slow release nitrogen fertilizer is generally preferable. Overapplying fertilizer (any type) can causes water quality issues.



Know when and where to apply. Apply only after spring "green up" and before mid-September. Avoid applying in mid-summer. Never apply near waterbodies or storm drains.

Somersworth Fire Department & Emergency Management A Safety Message from the Fire Chief's Office

Wildfires - Not Just in the West! Safety Message from the Fire Chief's Office

For those who pay attention to the national news, often times there is a brush fire or forest fire burning somewhere in the western part of the United States. These fires are often devastating with dry conditions, an abundance of natural fuel, and many homes in the wildland urban interface (WUI). This type of fire seems remote and distant when viewed on TV.

One of the charms of our great City is that it is a unique array of urban, suburban, and rural areas with large swaths of forested lands and open space. Various storms over the past few years and the normal four-season cycle have added to the fuel load on the ground. Consequently, the potential for wildfire in Somersworth can be elevated with dry conditions, high winds, and irresponsible open burning.

To place all of this in an east coast perspective, nearly 60 years ago in the Staten Island Burrough of New York City, on a day known as "Black Saturday", 100 homes were destroyed, as three different fires simultaneously burned through multiple neighborhoods. This year in our own Strafford County there have been several serious wildland fires with actual or threatened damage

to buildings and homes.

The threat of wildfire in Somersworth is very real. As Smokey Bear has said for decades "Only YOU can prevent forest fires". The Somersworth Fire Department asks that you keep your property clear of dead vegetation, abide by all open burning restrictions, use good judgement when authorized to burn, and ensure your fire is completely out when finished burning.

7 Ways Residents Can Reduce the Risk that their Homes & Property Will Become Fuel for a Wildfire

#1

Clear

Clear off pine ne<mark>edles</mark>, de<mark>ad leaves</mark> & anything tha<mark>t can bu</mark>rn from your rooflines, gu<mark>tters, dec</mark>ks, porches, patios & a<mark>long fence li</mark>nes. Falling embers <mark>will have nothi</mark>ng to burn.

#3

Screen & Seal

Wind-borne embers can get into homes easily through vents & other openings and burn the home from the inside out. Walk around your house to see what openings you can screen or temporarily seal up.

#5

Trim

Trim back any shrubs or tree branches that come closer than 5 feet to the house and attachments, and any overhanging branches.

#7

Close

If ordered to evacuate, make sure all windows & doors are closed tightly, and seal up any pet doors. Many homes are destroyed by embers entering these openings and burning the house from the inside out.

#2

Store Away

Store away furniture cushions, rattan mats, potted plants & other decorations from decks, porches & patios. These items catch embers and help ignite your home if you leave them outside.

#4

Rake

Embers landing in mulch that touches your house, deck or fence is a big fire hazard. Rake out any landscaping mulch to at least five feet away.

#6

Remove

Walk around your house and remove anything within 30 feet that could burn, such as woodpiles, spare lumber, vehicles and boats – anything that can act as a large fuel source.

"Tomb Stone History from Forrest Glade Cemetery Grand Army of the Republic -

After the end of Civil War, fraternal organizations were formed for veterans to network and maintain connections with each other. A perfect fit for Somersworth, where a large amount of its population served in the Army of the North.

Many of the veterans used their shared experiences as a basis for fellowship.

Groups of men began joining together, first for camaraderie and later for political power, strength in numbers.

Emerging as one of the most influential among the various organizations was the Grand Army of the Republic, founded on April 6, 1866, on the principles of "Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty," in Decatur, Illinois. The building at the corner of High Street and Highland Street what was to become known as the GAR Building before the demise of the Grand Army of the Republic the Post in Somersworth could be considered the meeting place of those who had helped form the city, and those who would influence its future direction. The Post was dedicated to and named after, Capt. Joshua Littlefield.

April 1861, shots were fired at Fort Sumter; the War Between the States had begun.

It should be remembered that Somersworth was a town that revolved around the mill, a cotton mill. The War Between the States would adversely affect life in Somersworth. Without Southern cotton every aspect of Somersworth would suffer.

Joshua enlisted in the Union Army the 27th of May 1861.

Although Joshua was in his early forties he lied and said his age to be 32 when he enlisted.

Quickly those of rank realized his maturity and promoted him to Lieutenant within a couple of weeks of his enlistment, a wise decision for those who saw a potential leader. By August of his first year of service he was promoted to the rank of Captain.

On the evening of August 28th 1861 Capt. Littlefield was told of his transfer to the 11th NH and subsequent promotion to Lt. Col., a rank he would never see.

Disregarding his order of transfer Capt. Littlefield chooses to ride with his present Company into a planned battle the next day.

The 29th of August 61, the Second Battle of Bull Run began. Capt. Littlefield led his Company in a charge over a heavily fortified railroad, a trap where the Confederates lay in waiting on three sides.

The battle was a disaster for Joshua, receiving three severe wounds he would lay dying ever so slowly on a battlefield that both sides would eventually retreat from.

Lying severely wounded with no food, no water, the hot day of the battle turned into a cold night of mourning and screaming. Hundreds of the critically wounded lay crying and praying aloud. The fortunate died the first night.

With both sides in full retreat left the wounded to fend for themselves or die.

Days brought on the heat and thirst, nights the cold and hunger.

They were abandoned for almost a week.

Eventually both sides returned to the battlefield not to resume the fight but to bury the dead. It was during this battlefield burial the body Capt. Joshua Littlefield was discovered and found to be alive. Hanging on by a thread he was rushed to a Union Hospital only to meet his own death on the 4th of September.

He was accorded one of the grandest burial services in Forest Glade Cemetery.

Danger!

As we unearth hazardous materials from our basements and garages for springcleaning, it presents a quandary of what to do with them. Utilizing the upcoming Household Hazardous Waste collection event on May 1, 2021 at

Turnkey landfill is a safe way to dispose of these materials. This event is held annually in early May. But we *can* make better choices today and every day:

Window Cleaner: Fill a spray bottle ½ of the way with vinegar, then top off with water. **Oven Degreaser**: Sprinkle grease stains with baking soda and scrub with a dry rag.

Toilet Bowl Cleaner: Use baking soda or vinegar

Rug Deodorizer: Deodorize dry carpets by sprinkling liberally with baking soda. Wait at least 15 minutes and vacuum.

The Somersworth Sustainability Committee is focusing on reduction of pesticide use, which significantly jeopardizes our ecosystem(and subsequently our own human health). Somersworth is among 14 Seacoast communities signed on to the EPA Great Bay Nitrogen Reduction General Permit. Among the requirements is measurably reducing the release of nitrogen in the Great Bay Estuary over the next 5 years, and implementing/promoting the use of fewer chemical-based herbicides and fertilizers.
