

### Leadership is Developed.

It is studied, acquired, and learned through observation and life experiences of failures and successes. True leadership is a willingness to sacrifice; a sacrifice of the gift of time and willingness to navigate through the turbulent waters of negative discourse, manipulation of truth and personal attacks. Yet, those that lead stride through. They stride through to ensure the success of Community moves forward. The leader has a keen understanding that there is something bigger than self, and does not abandon their morals, ethics, or commitment towards that direction.

The passion for Community and creating systems that will continue to evolve our democratic principles is what must be at the base of those that lead. Ensuring possibilities exist for achievement and economic advancement of all citizens must be a foundational pillar of those who were given our consent to govern. One simply does not lead with ethics or integrity because they claim to. Nor, are those

words bestowed upon one seeking to lead because they have imbedded them within their personal psyche or campaign slogans. Instead, it comes natural to those who are willing to serve from the pure heart and continue doing so even when attacked or demonized. Over the course of our human history, names have been inscribed within the halls of global leadership, leaders who have led by heart and soul despite the barrage of hateful discourse or violence they encountered; Christ, Gandhi, Martin Luther King, all have joined the ranks of those who were followed and adamantly opposed. Yet, they stayed the course, pure of heart and intentions and led. All bringing society and the world to a better place, all while attacked and losing their lives on the journey to human betterment.

The status quo is not something which is acceptable for the leader. Some free advice was one bestowed upon me by a close friend and mentor, the advice spoke truth about the complexities of modern leadership.

The leader leads those towards the vibrant, while given little time to argue and engage with those who wish to occupy the dense. For the leader knows if you fight and argue against those who wish to remain in the dense, you lose, and have moved yourself into the space they wish to remain in. It is wisdom that is an invitation to vibrancy and the best tool to diffuse density. It is the wisdom, knowledge and vison of a true leader that can guide a Community away from the ill nature of the big fishes who consistently live for the world of detriments in a small pond".

Leadership is not easy. It is tiring, wearing on the soul and a very empty lonely place. It is a place that many claim to occupy but the harsh reality is few will rise to represent the meaning of the word. Having gained consent, or winning an election does not make you a leader. Engaging in postings, tweets or acting like one has strength from the safety of their computer does also not give one rights to the word leadership. Leadership is not making statements to others that "This is about a revolution" or discrediting those attempting to ensure the waters of stagnation do not suffocate the pulse of progression.

Leadership is not about self. Leadership is about others.

Leadership is an understanding that others have joys, and experience pain. That others live in a world of happiness and loneliness. That some will reach incredible success, while others will live in a world of struggle. It's about striking a balance between the have and have nots. Between those with faith, those who do not believe and those seeking answers. Its ensuring, ensuring the rights we were promised are delivered upon. Delivered to everyone! And it is about commitment, commitment to the struggles and pain of growing democracy into the system that can truly deliver hope to the human spirit.

Leadership is not about self, it's about others. It is with this matrix that those who have attempted or are attempting to lead will be judged upon the passages of history.

### **Registering to Vote in New Hampshire**

You can register to vote at the City Clerk's office, Monday through Friday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Voter registration must be done at least 7-10 days prior to any election to be on the election day checklist. These session are based on when the Supervisors of the Checklist need to meet prior to the election(s) or filing period(s). Please reference the website for when the sessions are posted.

The Supervisors of the Checklist session are also an additional time to register to vote. The Supervisors of the Checklist is Tomorrow, November 2 at 4:00 pm in the City Clerk's Office. In addition, you may register to vote at the polls on election day.

A person must meet the following to register and vote in New Hampshire:

- 18 years of age or older on election day;
- A United States Citizen; and
- Domiciled in the City and/or ward where the person seeks to vote.

### **Replacement of Residential Water Meters**

### **Attention – Somersworth Water Customers**

The City of Somersworth has contracted with Hydro Utilities of Westford,

Massachusetts to replace residential water meters throughout the City. The

project is expected to start this fall. Property owners will be contacted to schedule an appointment with the contractor to remove the old meter and replace it with a new meter. Homes recently constructed will not require a

new meter, and will not be contacted to schedule an appointment. Contractors will also be inspecting water connections to see if any lead water service components are present. In the event there is evidence of lead water service components, property owners will be notified and may wish to have them replaced.

City of Somersworth Intends to Apply for a Federal EPA Brownfields Grant for the Property located at 261 Main Street, the former J.A. Prince & Sons Garage. The City is requesting feedback to the draft grant application, Analysis of Brownfields Cleanup Alternatives (ABCA Report 2022), and Threshold Criteria. The draft proposal will be available until November 10, 2023 which includes description of site

contamination and cleanup proposal, cost and implementation plans. 




### Kids Club Wednesdays at 5:30 pm









### **Discounted Museum Passes**




### **Interlibrary Loan Program**

### **SNOW EMERGENCY PARKING PERMITS**

Permits for Noble Street and River Street parking during snow emergency parking bans are available.

Somersworth allows permit parking during snow emergency parking bans on Noble Street adjacent to the Noble Pines Park, and on River Street adjacent to Jules Bisson Park.

Permits to park there during parking bans resulting from a snow emergency are available from November 1st thru March 31st at a rate of \$20.00 per month, and are available at the Police Department.

There are 17 spaces available on Noble Street and 5 spaces available on River Street. Permits will be issued on a first come, first served basis. The permits are only valid during the dates listed when there is a snow emergency parking ban in effect.

Vehicles parked in this area with a valid permit must be moved by 8 am on the day following the completion of the parking ban to allow for snow removal from the designated area.

Vehicles not moved will be subject to being towed at the owner's expense.

### Somersworth Fire Department & **Emergency Management**



Veteran's Day, Carbon Monoxide Awareness Month, and Thanksgiving A Monthly Update and Safety Message from the Fire Chief's Office

Veteran's Day and the Fire Service: On the 11<sup>th</sup> hour, of the 11<sup>th</sup> day, in the 11<sup>th</sup> month of 1918, the armistice between the allied powers and Germany went into effect ending "the war to end all wars". Over the years, recognition of the armistice ending WW I has evolved into the national holiday that we now know as Veteran's Day.

On Wednesday, 11 November we pause to remember and thank all veterans for their sacrifices and commitment to the defense of freedom including Somersworth Fire Department personnel Lt Mathew Moore (USN), Lt Michael Spinney (USAF), and FF Donald O'Brien (USMC).

The presence of veterans across the Fire Service in the United States has been prevalent since the military demobilization following WW II. This enduring presence has strengthened the Fire Service by reinforcing the fire command system, placing an emphasis on training and procedures, and focusing on mission accomplishment where "failure is not an option". Our most important activity is responding to emergencies and calls for service today while our second most important activity is preparing to respond tomorrow.

Carbon Monoxide Awareness Month: Carbon monoxide (CO) is a colorless and odorless gas that is produced as a byproduct of incomplete combustion of wood and fossil fuels (charcoal, heating oil, propane, natural gas, etc.). CO is also present in the exhaust of diesel and gasoline powered engines. According to the Journal of the American Medical Association, CO poisoning is the number one cause of accidental poisoning in the United States and is responsible for an average of 450 deaths each year.

To guard against CO, have your chimney and furnace/boiler serviced on a regular basis. In addition, if there is an electrical power failure, don't move your grill inside or use other unauthorized or dangerous heating devices to keep warm. Place a portable generator well away from the house – not in the garage, or in a breezeway, or on the deck.

With CO being colorless and odorless, medical signs and symptoms often appear when it is too late and can mimic other conditions including nausea, headaches, dizziness, weakness, chest pain and vomiting. In more severe poisoning cases, people may experience disorientation or unconsciousness, or suffer long-term neurological disabilities, cardiorespiratory failure, or death.

Consequently, a properly placed and maintained CO detector/alarm is an absolute necessity in your home. For details on CO alarm placement and other CO considerations, see the CO Safety sheet that follows.

In the event of a CO alarm activation, move all occupants to fresh air and call 9-1-1. Please do not call the business line to the Somersworth Fire Department as it is not answered if Fire Department personnel are out of the Fire Station on a call. The 9-1-1 call centers are staffed 24/7/365 – your call will always be answered.

We are all well aware of the strain that heating prices are placing on households across the City. However, please do not use grills, space heaters, ovens, the stove, or other dangerous heating sources especially those with an open flame. Carbon monoxide (as described above) and the risk of fire are very real and life threatening.

With the celebration of Thanksgiving near the end of the month, the SFD wants to remind you that Thanksgiving is often the worst day of the year for house fires. With crowed home kitchens, children running around, hot stoves and ovens, pots and pans that may have improperly placed handles, as well as other hazards,

the potential is high for someone to get hurt or burned, or for a fire to ignite. Take a moment to think through your activities so as to keep those celebrating with you safe.

Feel free to call the Fire Station if you have questions about any emergency management, fire prevention, or life safety topic.

Note: The categories used to report monthly incidents are those mandated by the National Fire Incident Reporting System (NFIRS). Most categories are self-explanatory. For those categories that are not obvious, the following examples can add clarity: Good Intent Call - a reported fire that turns out to be steam from a dryer vent; Severe WX/Natural Disaster - a lightning strike or tree falling on a house that requires an inspection to ensure there is no fire; and a Special Incident

- low frequency event such as a citizen's complaint of an ordinance or code violation.

For the most recent reporting period of September, 2023, Stewart's Ambulance responded to 126 emergency calls in the City, transported on 89 of those calls, and had an average response time of three minutes and fifty-three seconds (03.53). A mutual aid ambulance was required to respond into the City four (4) times during the reporting period.

Note: The SFD responds with Stewart's on the more serious medical calls and any time a mutual aid ambulance responds into the City. In addition, FD EMTs and AEMTs assist Stewart's with transports when a driver and/or additional EMS providers are required.



### Thanksgiving is one of the largest get-togethers in the US

follow these safety tips to keep your friends and family safe:

- Be sure electric cords are not dangling off the counter within easy reach of children or pets.
- Keep the floor clear of kids, toys, pets, bags, etc., so you don't trip while carrying hot food or liquids.
- Stay with your food in the kitchen while you're cooking. Stove fires start when we become distracted! —"When You Cook, Stay and Look!"
- Kids should stay 3 feet away from the stove.
- Use the back burners when cooking, and turn pot/pan handles towards the back where little hands can't reach.

### Department of Public Works & Utilities: Residential Solid Waste and Recycling Collection Services -7am set outs:

Residents are asked to set out trash bags and recycling bins during their weekly collections **no** later than 7am on the day of collection. The City's contractor WMI follows the Solid Waste Ordinance which states:

Residents are asked to not assume that WMI trucks arrive later in the morning and set out materials after 7am based on past experiences. WMI trucks are assigned daily routes and are subject to starting specific routes at different times due to equipment, traffic and other operational needs. Only constant is they all begin collection on City streets at 7am. Asking WMI to return to missed stops due to late set outs can contribute to cost increases to the City and WMI trucks are not always available to return due to other schedule priorities.

### Non- Metal Bulky Waste Disposal Please get "Bulky Waste" Stickers

All non-metal bulky waste items require "Bulky Waste" Stickers. These stickers cost \$4.00/per 50lbs and can be purchased using cash, check, or credit/debit cards at City Hall or at the Department of Public Works, **checks only**. Non-Metal Bulky items will be collected by Waste Management and must be placed curbside by 7:00am on your normal trash collection day with the appropriate amount of Bulky Waste Stickers visible to the Waste Management driver.

Residents are reminded that items set out for collection without Bulky Waste Stickers will not be collected and are subject to code violations for a property non-compliance.

### **Metal Pick-up**

The Department of Public Works reminds residents that metal pick up occurs on the 2nd Tuesday of the month. The November collection will occur on Tuesday, November 8. Residents wanting this service are asked to call Public Works no later than 3:00 pm on Monday, November 13 to be placed on the pickup schedule for November. Participants are reminded to place the proper number of tags on the item when setting the item out on the street for collection. Typical TV's require three (3) stickers - \$12.00 and PC's require one (1) sticker - \$4.00. Residents may also opt to drop off metal and electronic items with proper bulky waste stickers at the Public Works Facility located at 18 Lilac Lane from 7:30am-2:30pm Monday –Friday.

### **Brush and Bagged Leaves Collection:**

Public Works Highway crews will start collecting residential brush during the week of November 20 through the 24. Residents need to call Public Works at 692-4266 by Friday, November 17th to be placed on the pick-up list. Please note, brush can be up to five (5) inches in diameter and ten (10) feet long.

Department Highway crews will also be collecting bagged leaves the week of November 27 through December 1. Residents do not need to call to be put on a list for this service. Bagged leaves should be placed curbside on your regular trash pick-up day, no later than 7am. The paper leaf bags can be purchased at grocery store chains, hardware stores, and Home Depot.

### Malley Farm

Reminder that the Malley Farm brush and leaf pile will remain open through the Fall and early Winter as long as the weather conditions permit. Typically, Malley Farm will close after the first major snow event in the City. Hours of operation are: Monday - Friday 7:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Saturday & Sunday 8:00 a.m. - 6:00 p.m.

## Driveway, Obstruction & Trench Opening Permit Reminder-Winter Moratorium takes effect November 15-April 15.

As a reminder, any work done within the City Right-Of-Way requires a permit. Examples include resurfacing or rebuilding your driveway, with a new driveway apron connecting to the streets, street openings for utility connections and if occupying a street or sidewalk with staging or roll- off for debris removal /property repairs. The annual winter moratorium takes effect from November 15-April 15; prohibiting any excavating or work in the ROW during this period. If you have questions on the work you intend to complete within the Right-Of-Way, please call the Public Works Department at 692-4266. Permit applications can be located at the City website on the Public Works & Utilities Engineering page.

### Protect your household water lines

The colder weather can put your water pipes at risk of freezing and bursting which could cause extensive water damage.

Here are a few things you can do to protect your water lines:

- Keep building temperatures as consistent as possible, never less than 55 degrees Fahrenheit.
- Insulate areas where water supply lines are located and eliminate drafts.
- If you have water pipes in basements, crawl spaces, or outside walls, insulate the pipes, using pipe-sleeves or other insulating material.
- Allow warm air to circulate by opening up doors to closets and cabinets where pipe chases are located.

If you suspect that a pipe is particularly susceptible to freezing, as an emergency measure, leave water running at a trickle to prevent freezing. This is never recommended as a permanent measure and should be monitored frequently. Never use torches or devices with open flames to thaw frozen pipe.


