# **The Mayor's Corner**

On Monday, April 22, the City Council of the City of Somersworth passed the Fiscal Year 2024-2025 Budget. This was a major accomplishment that came after months of tireless work by myself, my colleagues on the city council and school board, and city and school district staff. As many are probably aware, and as I made clear in the last city newsletter, this budget was a challenge and a puzzle from the beginning. With it being a revaluation year here in



the city, we were not able to include new development when calculating the tax cap, which put stricter limits on the amount we were able to raise from taxes without an override. Beyond that, adjustments due in-part to inflation also chipped away at the amount of available flexibility in the budget for non-salary related items. However, regardless of these challenges the City Council worked effectively to develop a budget that provides the maximum amount of services with the smallest impact possible on taxpayers. I applaud the effort everyone put in, and hope folks understand that these difficult decisions were made after much thought, consideration, and debate. I am pleased that through deep discussion and negotiation we ended up with a budget that seems to best satisfy the needs of our community.

The agreements made by the City Council included a number of amendments to the budgets which..

- Increased school funding by an additional \$650,000
- Restored spending on city road repairs to \$900,000 in order to continue needed maintenance of city roads
- Increased investments in a number of nonprofits that provide essential services within the city, including increases to COAST bus services to help offset rider service fees, additional funding for the Community Food Pantry, and funding for Pope Memorial Humane Society
- Allowed for the hiring of a part-time Police Patrol Officer earlier in the year
- Increased the use of the General Fund which acts as the city's savings account in order to help offset the impact of this budget on our city's taxpayers.

Other items that were included in the budget as presented were...


- The addition of an Mechanic to the Public Works Department
- The hiring of the Deputy Fire Chief for the full year
- Increases to the salaries of all city and school staff to create competitive and adequate wages
- The reconstruction of the High St. sidewalk along the west side, from West High St. to South St.
- The complete rebuild of Constitutional Way
- A Master Plan chapter update

After the final edits are incorporated, the adopted budget, which will include the changes and amendments listed above, will be posted <u>here on the city's website</u>.

#### NOTICE OF 2024 REVALUATION Real Estate Property Inspections Assessing Property Values

May, 2024

The City of Somersworth is currently in the process of performing a City-wide revaluation. A real estate

property "Revaluation" is an update of all property assessments, land and buildings within the City.

As part of this revaluation, Corcoran Consulting Associates, the City's contracted assessors, will be performing a field review of all properties in the City. The field review portion of this project is scheduled to start the first week of May 2024, and will be conducted through July 2024. In most cases, they will not need access to the interior of your property. Should they need access to the interior of your property, you will be notified in writing, in advance, and an appointment will be requested.

A Notice of New Property values is scheduled to be sent to property owners in August, and hearings will be scheduled in late August and September.




# Kids' Night Out event on Friday, May 31 from 5pm-

**Quality Time** is a new initiative offered by local seasoned teacher, Diana Metreaud. This program offers a unique approach to exploring social-








#### Baby Play Group Thursdays • 10:30am

School Resource Officer Scott South was recognized by Chief McLin and given the Random Acts of Blue Award (a community service award) for his work in the Schools.


#### **Officer Damian Gibson joined us on April 22.** He

#### **Somersworth Fire Department**

With the recent rain and melting snow, flooding may become a reality in your area. Following these simple safety tips will help keep you and your family safe if you encounter flooding. Flooding is a temporary overflow of water onto land that is normally dry. Floods are the most common disaster in the United States. Failing to evacuate flooded areas or entering flood waters



can lead to injury or death.

#### Floods may:

- Result from rain, snow, coastal storms, storm surges and overflows of dams and other water systems.
- Develop slowly or quickly. Flash floods can come with no warning.
- Cause outages, disrupt transportation, damage buildings and create landslides.

#### If you are under a flood warning:

- Find a safe shelter right away.
- Don't walk, swim or drive through flood waters. **Turn Around, you could Drown!**
- Remember, just 6 inches of moving water can knock you down, and one foot of moving water can sweep your car away.
- Stay off bridges over fast-moving water.
- Depending of the type of flood emergency information will provided.
  - o Evacuate if told to do so.
  - o Move to higher ground or a higher floor.
  - o Stay where you are.

Metal Pick-up: 2nd Tuesday of Each Month When: Curbside Collection: Tuesday, May14 How: Call Public Works no later than 3:00 pm on Monday, May 13, place curbside with the proper number of tags on each item. Typical TV's require three (3) stickers - \$12.00 and PC's require one (1) sticker - \$4.00.

#### **Malley Farm Facility**

Malley Farm is now open for disposal of brush and leaves, Monday – Friday 7:30am – 2:30pm and Saturday and Sunday 8:00am-6:00pm. Please note: Any Contractor serving a Somersworth residence with leaves and brush hauling, will need to obtain a permit from Public Works to dump at Malley Farm. Root balls and wood larger than 5" in diameter and 10' in length are not permitted. Please call the Public Works Department at 603-692-4266 for further information.

#### **Bagged Leaves and Brush Pickup**

**Brush will be picked up the third week in May.** You must call 603-692-4266 by Friday, April 12 and/or Friday, May 17 to be added to the pickup list. for brush collection. Please have your brush curbside no later than 7:00 am on Monday, April 15 and/or Monday, May 20 for pickup. Brush can be up to five (5) inches in diameter and ten (10) feet long.

**PLEASE NOTE:** Brush pickup is limited to 20 minutes per stop. Any remaining brush and cleanup of debris is the responsibility of the property owner.

**Bagged leaves will be picked up the fourth week in May**. You do not have to call ahead for bagged leaves pickup. Please have leaves curbside no later than 7:00am on your trash pickup day the week of May 27. Leaves and grass clippings must be in brown recyclable paper leaf bags, sold at many local stores

#### **Forest Glade Cemetery Spring Clean-up**

The Cemetery Trustees remind families of relatives buried at Forest Glade to remove all flowers, baskets and personalized items from grave spaces placed during the past winter by Friday, May 10<sup>th</sup>. The City's mowing contractor will be starting mowing services soon and removal of these items will improve access and avoid equipment damage.

#### Road Improvement Projects Begins

The City hired GMI for this year's street resurfacing work. Crews have already started and work is progressing well toward completion. Resurfacing work on the following streets are anticipated to be completed in early April-May include the following streets:



-W. High Street from Cemetery Road to High Street -Pleasant Street -Silver Street -Fremont Street.

Park Terrace Lane will be resurfaced in mid-summer after Unitil replaces a gas main.

#### Constitutional Way Complete Streets – Reconstruction

The City Council awarded a contract to Granese and Sons to construct the complete streets improvement project at Constitutional Way. The project involves new concrete sidewalks on both sides of the street, new water, sewer and stormwater collection and treatment systems, street furniture, pedestrian scale street lights and new asphalt surface. The project will begin in



early May with Eversource and Unitil replacing their utilities and then rest of the road reconstruction will begin. Staff anticipates the project to take a full construction season with some work possibly occurring in spring of 2025. Alternating travel lanes will occur during construction and occasionally complete road closure may be needed on a limited basis. Access to the properties off of Constitutional Way will be maintained during construction.

### **Code Enforcement**

#### **Upcoming Changes to Laws and Regulations:**

The Code Compliance Office would like to remind property owners and prospective buyers that the New Hampshire's Department of Health and Human Services has new housing regulations that will go into effect July 1, 2024. These regulations, covered in NH RSA 130-A, will require Lead Safe Certificates for qualified buildings before a Certificate of Occupancy can be issued by the City of Somersworth for new development projects. Please see the fact sheet from NH DHHS to see if your building project qualifies.



# RSA 130-A:5-d Sale and Rental of Property In Effect July 1, 2024

New Hampshire's Department of Health and Human Services is calling attention to a section of RSA 130-A Lead Paint Poisoning Prevention and Control, passed on April 9, 2018, that will go into effect July 1, 2024. Lead poisoning is 100% preventable

#### Who Should Be Aware of This Law?



The following *shall* require certification of lead safety **prior to** being used as either a residential rental unit or as a day care facility:

- Newly-constructed rental units within buildings erected prior to January I, 1978. ("Newly-constructed rental units" means rental units being converted from a use other than residential rental housing.)
- Newly-licensed day care facilities within buildings erected prior to January 1, 1978.

#### RSA 130-A:5-D SALE AND RENTAL OF PROPERTY

#### What Does This Mean for Residential Properties?

All pre-1978 properties being converted into residential rental housing will be required to have a Lead-Safe Certificate issued by a licensed NH Risk Assessor prior to occupancy.

#### What types of properties does this apply to?

- Pre-1978 residential properties being converted into rental housing, including properties such as mill buildings or other large buildings being converted from another use to residential housing
- Pre-1978 residential properties being converted to add rental units
- Single-family homes that used to be owner-occupied being put on the residential rental market

#### What type of properties does this not apply to?

- Residential rental properties
  already in existence
- Owner-occupied homes

# What Does This Mean for Childcare Facilities?

RSA 130-A:5-d does not require currently licensed childcare facilities to obtain a Lead-Safe Certificate; however, it does require any *newly* licensed childcare facilities opening in a property built prior to 1978 to have a Lead-Safe Certificate on file issued by a licensed NH Risk Assessor.



It only takes a speck of lead dust the size of a grain of salt to poison a child.

Somersworth High School's Student Health Center Gather Momentum. Behavioral Health Specialist Martin Bernstein and Nurse Practitioner Tara Kenney have worked regular hours at Somersworth High School's Student Health Center since its December opening. They serve as many as 20 students each week and are working to accommodate more.

Martin is providing scheduled

counseling appointments three full days each week, while Tara is at the school two afternoons each week offering medical care—including preventive services,

sports physicals, and "urgent care" style visits for acute injuries and illnesses. Both providers are able to  $\Box$  see any student enrolled at the high school with a parent or guardian consent form in place. Martin's counseling is often provided to students on a regular schedule to build skills over time. Though Martin's services are in high demand, they haven't had to turn students away due to the center's capacity.

Many of Tara's referrals are for students without primary care providers or regular access to health care. They anticipate that vaccinations will become available to students within the next few weeks. "We are slowly chipping away at these students' needs," says Sarah Carsman, the healthcare outreach manager of the Greater Seacoast Community Health and Goodwin Health, who is helping oversee health center operations. "We don't turn anyone away because □ of an inability to pay. Our sliding scale allows all students to access health care, and the center location makes it convenient."

Carsman and other administrators are reviewing the center's first few months in operation. They have adjusted their scheduling and other practices as needed to meet center demands while keeping an eye on the future. Though the Student Health Center will temporarily close its high school location for the summer, students will continue to have access to Tara and Martin by telehealth or at Goodwin Community Health in Somersworth.

Martin has been considering offering summer workshops to teachers interested in strengthening their abilities  $\Box$  to support students in areas such as team building and communication skills. Carsman says they are beginning to think about expanding acute and primary care services to middle school students in the fall. "We are happy with our progress and we will only go up from here," says Carsman.


